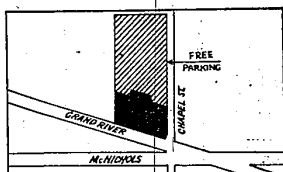

Consumers Power Announces Start On New Gas Line To Service Area

Construction of a 30-mile-long 16-inch natural gas pipeline to strengthen the natural gas supply system serving many communities in Oakland, Wayne and Macomb counties, is now underway near Novi.

From a metering point near South Lyon the big new pipeline will extend eastward to Consumers Power Company's gas distribution station on Coolidge Highway in Royal Oak, bringing natural gas from the Panhandle Eastern Pipe Line Company lines at South Lyon. Panhandle pipes natural gas from Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and other states for local distribution by Consumers.

Among communities to benefit from the new line will be Walled Lake, Livonia, Plymouth, Northville, Wayne, Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Pontiac, Ferndale, Royal Oak and East Detroit.

David H. Gerhard, division manager of Consumers Power Company's Southeast Division, said the new pipe line will provide an additional gas feed into the southern end of Consumers' gas distribution system in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties. At present all bulk natural gas for this region comes from pipe line connections near Pontiac and Mt. Clemens.

Mr. Gerhard said the line will enable the company to deliver much larger supplies of natural gas as these become available to the company in the future. Consumers has a large backlog of applications for house heating and other space heating service which cannot be met until a larger supply of natural gas can be obtained.

he said. There are no restrictions on other types of gas service in the company's service area. New connections will be made to the lines extending into the Northville natural gas fields and south into Livonia, to serve as an additional supply carrier for western Wayne County communities, Mr. Gerhard said.

Construction of the pipeline began a few days ago at a point north of Novi and the line is extending eastward from here to Royal Oak. A second construction crew began installation at South Lyon and is moving eastward to Novi. Mr. Gerhard said it is expected that the line will be completed in early November.

DETROIT TO HOST AREA TB MEETING OCTOBER 11-13

Detroit will officially host this year's Mississippi Valley Conference on Tuberculosis and Mississippi Valley Trudeau Society, October 11-13. Over 800 delegates are expected to attend sessions at the three-day conference scheduled for the Statler Hotel in Detroit.

Approximately 45 educators and physicians, representing 12 states, will address the gathering on the detection and treatment of tuberculosis.

Michigan's Senator Charles E. Potter will deliver the keynote address at the opening session on Thursday, October 11. The U. S. Public Health Service, Washington, D. C. will send a special representative to address the conference. Dr. Edward T. Blomquist, chief, division of special health, will deliver a speech on the role of "The Public Health Service" at the Thursday morning session.

When delegates convene for the Friday afternoon session, they will hear talks and panel discussions by four Detroit physicians. Dr. Paul T. Chapman, who will speak before the gathering on "Modern Treatment" at the opening session on Thursday, will preside at the October 12 meeting.

Conrad R. Lam, M. D., Henry Ford Hospital, Detroit, will moderate the panel, discussion of "Problems in Open Heart Surgery." Participating in the discussion will be Forest Dewey Dorrill, M. D., Detroit.

Another panel, "Pulmonary Surgery," will have as its moderator Paul V. O'Rourke, M. D., Detroit. One of the discussants announced for the panel talks is Jay C. Day, M. D., Detroit.

A noteworthy feature at the Conference this year will be a "television clinic." An outstanding Detroit TV personality, Mary Morgan, of CKLW-TV will appear at the clinic which will be chaired by John Wherry, Iowa TB and Health Association, Des Moines.

On Friday morning, delegates will have an opportunity to hear the results of a long study on "Tuberculosis in Children" when Edna Jones, M. D., Maybury Sanatorium, Northville, addresses the Conference. Dr. Jones' talk will deal with the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of tuberculosis in children.

All of the sessions of the conference are open to the general public. No fee is required for visitors attending.
