Audit Of Individual's Social Security Advised

Individuals covered by social security would do well to request an audit of their account from the government, a University of Michigan professor of finance believes. Prof. Wilford J. Eklund says few people recognize they have the right to request an audit of wages credited to their social security accounts by the government. Those who fail to have credits checked periodically can have no corrections made by the government after a three-year period without the consent of their employer.

While social security officials have described the chance of an error in individual accounts as remote, four out of five Ann Arbor residents who recently requested an audit found that their government accounts of wage

Tickets for the dance have now gone on sale and may be purchased from any member of the association social committee. They are also available through the various area directors in the subdivision, it was revealed.

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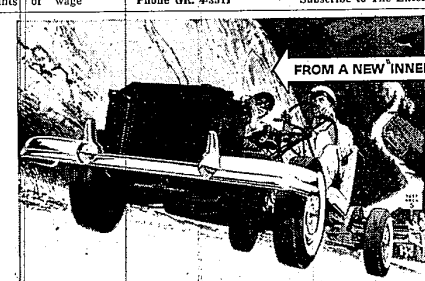
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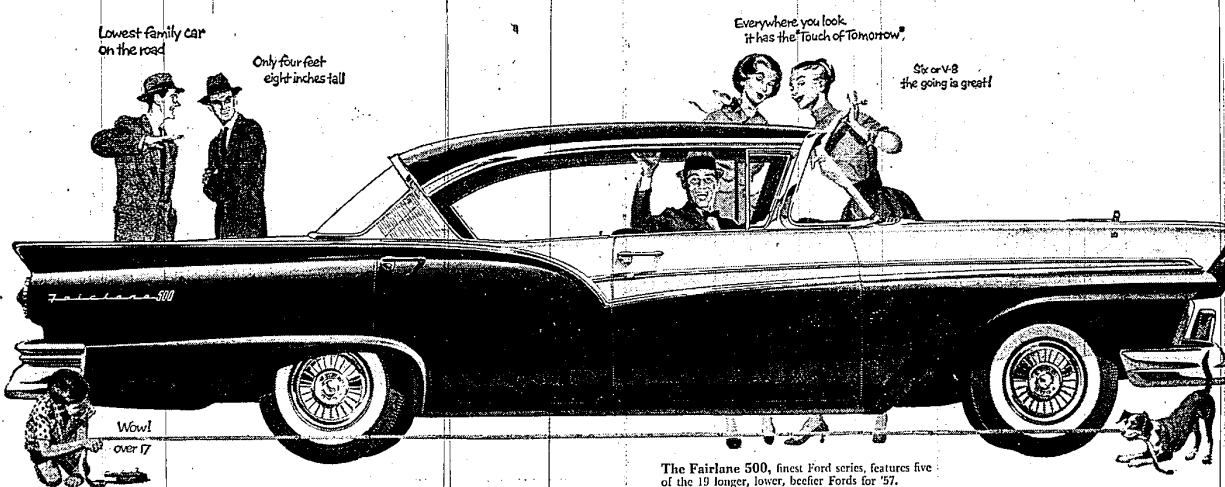
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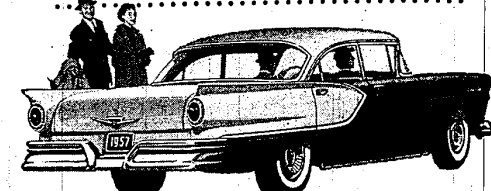
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
