

# No Virus Deer Deaths Reported

Michigan's deer herd apparently has not been hit hard this fall by the virus disease which killed several hundred whitetails last year at this time, the Conservation Department stated.

No outbreak of deer deaths has been reported to Conservation Department field offices as yet. It was indicated during September-early autumn.

Examination of dead deer indicated a virus infection caused the deaths. Earlier, it was believed the animals had been poisoned by eating withering cherry leaves, but this theory was discounted by tests at the Department's Houghton Lake wildlife station.

The virus disease also has struck deer herds in other states during recent years and prompted intensive study of the malady.

## Falcon Gridders Turn In Stellar Performance Friday Under Arcs, But Are Edged Out By Waterford, 13-7

Though losing out to Waterford last Friday night under the arcs, the Farmington Falcon gridders showed a marked improvement over previous performances, showing all the fight and determination that is needed to make up a winning team.

The greatest improvement was shown in the sharp defensive play which the Falcon ended displayed throughout the contest against the powerful Waterford offensive efforts.

Taking the Falcon's opening kickoff, the Waterford team ground out two first downs to push inside the 20. Here, however, the Falcon defensive threw up a stone wall and held them on downs.

Taking over the ball on the 17, Mike Agee huffed the pigskin to the 27 on the first play, but the Falcons were unable to advance it far enough on the next three tries. The Falcons got a big break here when Waterford was charged with roughing the punter and 15 yards was marked off against them, giving the Falcons another chance with the ball.

Halfback Tom Kosty picked up seven yards on the first try and Agee moved it up to the 49 for the first down. On the next three carries by Bob Brewbaker, Kosty and Jerry Stainbrook another first down was picked up. After losing six yards on two more tries on the ground, Brewbaker pitched a pass to end Bud Jones which was good for 15 yards. Agee plunged in for one and another first down.

Three consecutive runs by Stainbrook were good for another first down and moved the Falcons into scoring position. Agee moved the ball to the one yard mark but on the next two plays the Falcons lost five yards. Kosty then took the ball from there and sliced off right guard to go in for the tally. Ray Porter's extra point boot was good and the Falcons led 7-0.

After kicking off to Waterford and holding them on downs Farmington took over the ball again on the Waterford 44. On the first carry, Kosty racked up 11 yards and Agee and halfback Dave Catherman combined in the next two carries to move the ball to the 32 yard marker on the second big move (downfield). Agee advanced the ball

to the 30 but here the drive stalled. Agee punted to the 20 where Waterford took over. They were able to advance, however, against stiff Falcon defensive play. Porter blocked an attempted boot out on fourth down and Farmington took over on the 15. Unable to move the ball themselves, a field goal was tried by Porter but went wide of the crossbars.

A Waterford pass was good but a second was intercepted by Catherman just before the half ended. The Falcons left the field at half-time holding the one touchdown edge.

On the opening kickoff of the second half Agee bobbled it and the ball rolled all the way back to the 2 yard line before he could recover it. Forced to punt out after two tries, Waterford took over on the 49. After plunging away on three tries, they shifted into a new offense and on a double reverse baffled the Falcon defense, carrying all the way to pay dirt. The extra point boot was blocked by Bob Arlington, however, and the Falcons still led.

The next time Waterford got their hands on the ball they marched all the way to the 19 and it was carried over there to pay dirt. The Falcons came back on a clipping penalty, however, nullifying the score. Another attempt to push it over failed.

Unable to move the ball on three attempts the Falcons attempted to punt out. The pass from center to Agee went over his head, however, and he was forced to fall in it at the 11 with Waterford taking over.

On the second play from scrimmage Waterford pushed over for the score and the extra point kick was good, giving them a 13-7 lead.

Following the kickoff, Farmington drove to the 24 but lost the ball on a fumble which was recovered by Waterford.

The game ended shortly afterwards with Waterford in possession and Farmington trying desperately to get possession again to try for a quick touchdown before time ran out.

Combining a powerful ground attack with power plays through the line and an effective aerial combination when needed, the Northville team racked up four touchdowns while holding the Trojan team to a lone tally. The final score of the game was 25-6.

One of Northville's tallies was scored on a spectacular 75 yard run by Dick Biery, after he had pulled in a pass from Ed Wittenberg. Scoring touchdowns for Northville besides Biery was Gary Holman and Bill Yahn.

The Trojans scored their lone touchdown in the fourth period following a sustained drive down field. Dale Devitt plunged through the line for the TD but the try for extra point was unsuccessful.

As the result of the loss, the Trojans were presented with the unpleasantness of having to hold the "victory barrel" trophy until next year until such time as they defeat the Northville eleven on the gridiron again.

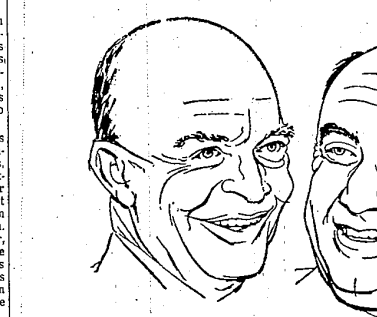
Kosty, who has carried the ball 28 times in the Falcons' first four games for a total of 145 yards, has gained an average of 5.2 yards per try. Lugging the ball 25 times, McLellan has a 4.2 yard average per attempt. Dave Catherman on 19 carries has averaged 33 yards and Gerald Stainbrook on 14 tries has picked up 3.2 yards per attempt.

Showing exceptionally well in the punting department in Farmington's first four contests this season has been Agee. He has punted 10 times and has averaged 36.5 a try. Dave Catherman, who has punted three times, has an average of 29.6 yards a try to his credit.

In the Falcons' first four games they have scored only four touchdowns and three extra points, while their opponents have racked up a total of 82 points. Over half of this total scored against them, however, was racked up in Southfield's 42-0 romp over them.

A powerhouse team this year, Southfield is considered to be the strongest club in the Inter-Lakes Conference this season, and is figured to have little trouble in walking off with the conference championship this year.
