at the University of Michigan stadium, athletic officials predicted. The new \$700,000 main and blue structure was put into use for the first time this fall. Complete with every facility for moving news rapidly, the press box is a tribute to the public need for accurate, speedy news coverage.

Back in 1927 when Michigan built the press box replaced by the new structure, communications were less complex. Radio was in its infancy, motion pictures of football games were rare, and television unheard of.

Developments in these areas outmoded the old press box. Now the new one contains 202 seats for working newsmen on the lower level, 38 locations for photographers in the middle tier and 17 radio and television booths on the top deck. Modern facilities for quick processing of news and photographs are provided.

The new athletic "communications center" is another milestone in athletic progress at U-M.

Farmington High To Take Part In Foreign Relations Project

Mr. James M. Becker, director of the North Central Association Foreign Relations Project, announced this week that Farmington Senior High School has been selected as one of 500 high schools throughout the nation to participate in the Foreign Relations Project.

Gerald Harrison, assistant superintendent of the Farmington schools, announced that Tarmo Mattila of the Department of Social Studies will take part in the experimental program in foreign relations education.

The project is sponsored by the North Central Association of Colleges and Universities under a grant from the Ford Foundation.

The objectives of the foreign relations education program are:

1. To stimulate interest in foreign affairs and understanding of its importance in our lives.
2. To develop better comprehension of the current basic American foreign policy problems.
3. To help develop ability to think critically about possible solutions of the problems of American foreign policy.
4. To develop techniques, methods and habits by which youngsters will continue their interest in and their study of foreign affairs.

Top Education Cost Only \$13.50 A Year In 1829

Back in 1829 you could get a high-class education in Ann Arbor for \$13.50 a year, according to F. Clever Bald, assistant director of the University of Michigan Historical Collections.

Historian Bald says that Meritt's Select School, started in Ann Arbor by Thomas W. and Moses Merrill, advertised as follows in the initial number (November 18, 1829) of "The Emigrant," the town's first newspaper:

"Select school for young gentlemen and ladies in Ann Arbor Village. Reading, spelling, mental arithmetic, modern geography, and English grammar at \$2.50 per quarter (three months); including writing, practical arithmetic, ancient geography, history, philosophy, chemistry, logic, astronomy, the higher branches of mathematics, composition, and declamation at \$3.00; including the Latin and Greek languages, \$4.50."

Large Brown Trout Netted To Be Studied

The largest brown trout on record in Michigan is due to a careful study by the Conservation Department's institute for fisheries research at Ann Arbor. The trout—weighing 19 pounds, four ounces—was taken August 29 in Lake Michigan approximately two miles north of Manistee by Robert Bjorkquist, commercial fisherman. Bjorkquist was fishing for walleyes when the big brown showed up in his nets.

The 31-inch trout was turned over to the Conservation Department and analysis will be made of scales and identifiable organs.
