## "Guys and Dolls Teen Club" Reviews Successful Period Of Formation

An organizational meeting of the "Guys and Dolls Teen Club," a joint project of the Clarenceville Optimists and Opti-Mrs., was held at the home of Ward E. Clement, Peach Avenue, last Monday night. Those present other than Mr. and Mrs. Ward Clement were Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Stanley and Mrs. Russell Waack. The "Guys and Dolls" teen dances are held every Friday night at the V. F. W. Hall, Grand River and Seven Mile Road. This was the thirteenth of the fourteen dances held. The club is open to all. It is endorsed by Ed McKenney of Station WXYZ.

Each week there is a live band and dance contests, door prizes or other amusements. There are only three rules that must be adhered to in order to attend any of the dances. It was pointed out: no one is admitted wearing blue jeans or levis; no disorderly conduct, and no one may leave the building and re-enter.

The Clarenceville Optimists and Opti-Mrs. are non-profit service organizations working mainly to help the youth of the community. This last project sponsored by them, namely the teen club, came into existence at the end of May. It was the hope of the teen dance committee at that time, as it is now, to try to raise enough money to put a community building for the youth of the surrounding communities where not only the dances could be held, but also a place where the youth could be employed by all. After only four months of operation, the club now boasts a bank account of over \$1,000, it was indicated.

Donations of \$50 each enabled the project to get off on a good start. The first dance was held on Saturday night, May 28, with the idea that Saturday nights would be the best for the dance. Since a hall could not be secured on Saturday nights every week of the year, however, the dance was thus moved to Friday nights.

The generosity of James Wilson made use of the V. F. W. hall possible at a nominal fee. Donating a sign for the club was Paul Shlake, a sign painter located at Grand River and Inkster Road. Adding in the project, Lowell Worley, president of the Detroit Federation of Teen Clubs, sent out 100 hit records to be given away free on opening night and arranged for Bobby Davis, recording star, to sing. Also aiding in getting the project underway were Al Plant and Jim Wright of "Teen Life Magazine," who provided a record player for intermission, and an amplifier for the orchestra. Through the efforts of all the first dance was a big success, and other weekly dances were conducted throughout the summer.

Members of both the Optimist and Opti-Mrs. clubs attended dances throughout the summer months to help in the organization of the club and to clapperboard. The heads of the teen club met with the adult committee on last Sunday afternoon and went over future plans for the group. Elected president of the teen club was Richard Soap and vice-president, Sharon Easter. Plans are now being made for a big Halloween party on October 26, with costumes also being given to a street dance, hay-rides and numerous other projects.

All teens in the community are being urged to attend the teen dances being held every Friday night and to join in the efforts to raise sufficient funds for a building for the club. Adults are also being urged to join in the project.

## Several Hunting Seasons Now Open

An army of hunters took to the woods, fields and marshes October 1 for the opening of several of Michigan's 1956 hunting seasons.

Most of the firearm hunters concentrated on waterfowl or ruffed grouse while archery hunters were in search of deer. A number of lesser seasons also opened. Most hunters, however, draw only incidental hunting.

The opening-day turnout was part of an estimated 750,000 small game hunters who go afield in Michigan this year.

The important southern Michigan pheasant, rabbit and squirrel seasons do not open until October 20, but all three species were opened for hunting in limited northern areas October 1.

Monday also marked the opening of upper peninsula seasons on sharp-shinned grouse and partridge. These seasons have no open season in the lower peninsula. The season also opened for woodchuck and raccoon which are not legal game in southern Michigan until October 20.

A statewide bear hunting season under small game license got underway October 1. Use of dogs is permitted during this season, which closes November 5. Bear also may be hunted under a bow and arrow deer license during an October 1-November 5 season, but dogs may not be used by archers. It was pointed out.

Thousands of waterfowl hunters tested their skill on the opening day of Michigan's October 1-December 9 season on ducks, geese, coots, rails and gallinules. Shorter seasons on woodchuck opened on October 1 in northern areas and will open October 20 in southern Michigan. A statewide 30-day season on jacksnipe opened October 1.
