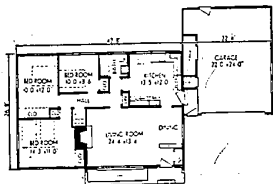

## Kenny Hospital Fully Accredited

The Sister Kenny Polio Hospital located at 80405 Grand River Avenue Cut-Off has received full accreditation by the Joint Commission of Accreditation of Hospitals. It was learned this week.

Kenny Hospital officials declared that the hospital had received full accreditation within the minimum period of time since it has been in this location in Farmington only since September of 1953. They pointed out that the commission does not consider any hospital until (1) it has been in operation a year (2) it maintains a 25 bed hospital and (3) the hospital has appeared on the American Hospital Association guide list published only every 12 months.

The Sister Kenny Hospital is also a member of the Detroit Area Hospital Council, Inc., the Michigan Hospital Association and the American Hospital Association. It is also a member agency of the Michigan United Fund affiliated with the United Foundation.

Kenny is currently converting its facilities to enter broader fields of rehabilitation in conjunction with its polio responsibilities. It was concluded.

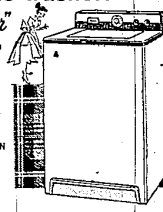

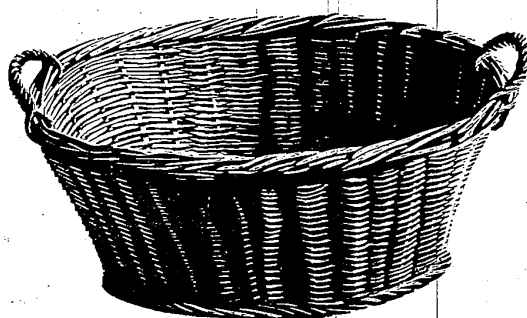
