

Dale Carnegie Demonstration  
Course Set Locally, October 25

Men and women of this and surrounding communities have been invited as guests at the action demonstration of the Dale Carnegie Course in leadership, human relations and effective speaking by the Farmington Junior Chamber of Commerce.

The demonstration will be held Thursday night, October 25, starting at 7:30 o'clock at the Farmington High School. It was announced by R. Lewis Brown, of Farmington, Carnegie chairman for the sponsoring organization. First session of the new Farmington class will be held at the same location just one week later. It was indicated.

Brown pointed out that those attending the demonstration will actually see in action Dale Carnegie's uniquely effective training methods. When a class is in session, students "learn by doing," not by listening to lectures, he said.

A Dale Carnegie class is designed for business executives and professional men who want to improve their speaking abilities, salesmen bent on developing greater confidence, merchants desirous of attracting more customers, secretaries seeking to improve their stenographic and housewives wishing to further their home and social lives. Often a husband and wife take the course together, under a special

tuition arrangement, it was revealed.

Members of the Farmington Junior Chamber of Commerce point to the fact that business and industry are increasingly using Dale Carnegie training of executive, supervisory and sales personnel. Regularly using the course are six of the top 20 United States corporations and more than 200 Michigan business concerns.

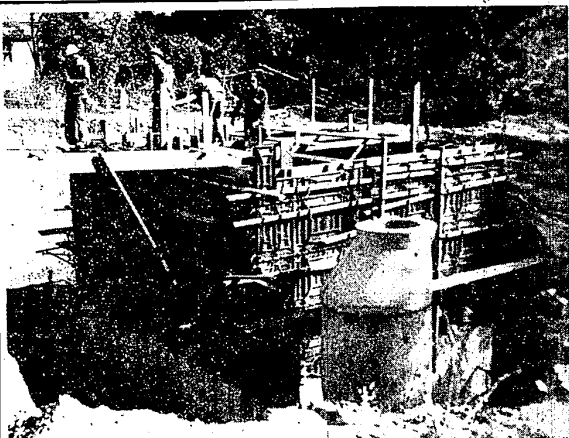
The demonstration will be conducted by John C. Tod of Royal Oak, one of Dale Carnegie's staff of highly trained Michigan instructors.
