Aging Of School Building Under Study At U. of M.

A picture of how the average public school building ages is being developed through research at the University of Michigan.

So far, the research has shown that schools pass through two critical periods in their life. In the third decade after construction, much of the equipment needs to be replaced and a general renovation is sometimes in order.

By the time the school reaches 40, several kinds of obsolescence—educational, structural and technical—reach their peak and a decision for a modernization program can usually be delayed no longer. Most schools are finally abandoned between ages 60 and 69.

The study has shown that if the present rate of expenditures for school construction is maintained, the shortage of school rooms in Michigan should be ended by 1963.

The immensity of the coal piles used to generate electricity is well demonstrated at one giant Ohio utility where the 300,000-ton stockpile reserve represents 22.8 per cent of one day's total U. S. mine production.

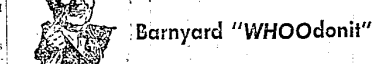

The way to spot a bad owl, according to Pops, is to put up a 10-foot pole in the chicken run with a No. 2 trap on it. A mauling bird generally perches to

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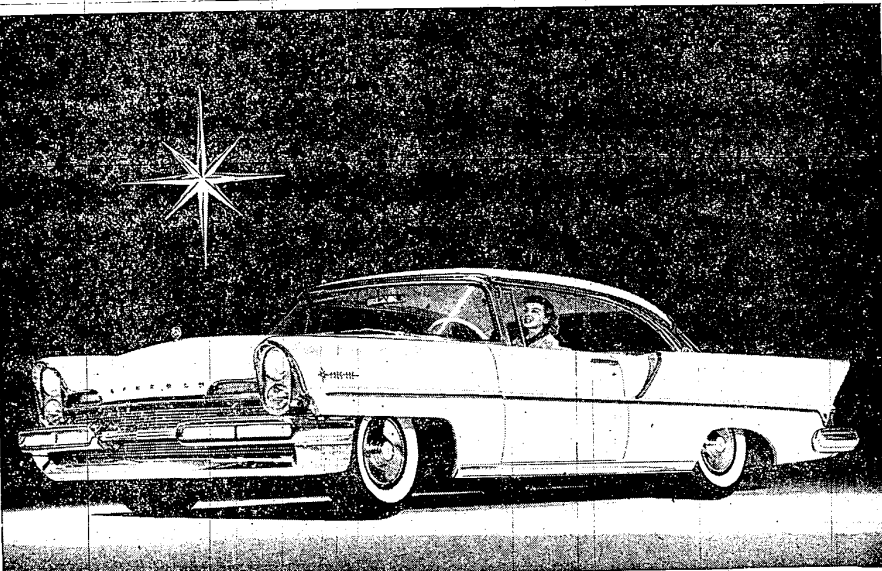
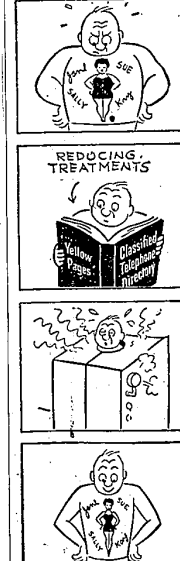
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
