

Virus Disease Has Polio Symptoms

Many cases reported as non-paralytic polio may not be polio at all, says a University of Michigan pediatrician.

Dr. James L. Wilson reports that "For years it has been known that a disease caused by the coxsackie virus has all of the symptoms and diagnostic indications of polio, except paralysis."

Chairman of the U-M department of pediatrics and communicable diseases, Dr. Wilson reports that two cases reported recently as non-paralytic polio at University Hospital were not polio at all, but the coxsackie virus disease.

"Extensive laboratory facilities and much time are needed by a hospital to distinguish between these two diseases," Dr. Wilson emphasizes.

Many published reports of new cases of non-paralytic polio indicate that the individual had received one or two shots of the Salk vaccine. "This does not imply in any way that the vaccine shots were at fault in not protecting the person from polio," Wilson asserts.

He adds: "It should be remembered the 1954 vaccine evaluation report did not credit the vaccine with preventing polio altogether. The report stated that the study indicated that the vaccine's effectiveness lay in its ability to reduce by a very high percentage, the incidence of paralytic polio."

"Recent reports of the U.S. Public Health Service continue to substantiate this. They indicate that there has not been one death from paralytic polio during 1955 reported in a person inoculated with three Salk polio shots in the prescribed manner," he states, adding that in both Michigan's 1955 paralytic polio report, and that of Chicago's epidemic, not one case of paralytic polio had occurred among those receiving the three shots.

He suggests that people who have had one or two shots of the vaccine, and later develop non-paralytic polio, very likely have been saved from paralysis by antibodies derived from the vaccine.

"Even in cases where mild paralysis occurs in a patient who has had one or two shots, it is probable that the limited amount of vaccine received prevented a more severe paralysis," Dr. Wilson concludes.

Scouts United To Get-Out-Vote

More than 25,000 Boy Scouts, Explorers and many of their adult leaders of the Detroit Area Council will climax their part in their nation-wide Get-Out-the-Vote campaign on Saturday, November 3. On that day they will call on more than 650,000 homes and leave on door-to-door a Liberty Bell hanger urging citizens to vote.

They have been conducting a non-partisan campaign, without reference to any candidate or party. It has been sponsored jointly with the Freedom Foundation, Inc. of Valley Forge. The message on the Liberty Bell doorknob hanger reads:

"Heed youth's call. Vote as you think, but vote November 6, 1956. Use your freedom to vote."

Householders will be asked to display these hangers in their windows indicating their intention to vote.

Amos R. Shields, Detroit Area Scout Executive, said that "the greater number of people who turn out to vote, the greater will be true democracy in action."

It was pointed out that while the campaign hopes to stimulate adults to meet their responsibilities of good citizenship by voting, that Boy Scouts and Explorers themselves will get a lesson in their duty to vote when they come of age.

Illegal Deer Hunting Brings Stiff Fines

Illegal deer hunting activities brought heavy fines to several Michigan residents, according to the latest report of conservation law convictions.

The report listed 76 violators who paid \$1735 in fines and \$609 in costs in justice courts throughout the state. Eighteen of the convictions were for illegal deer hunting.

Two men, from Stephenson and Ingalls, were ordered to pay fines of \$100 each plus \$8.40 in costs.

State Fish License Sales Drop This Year

Sales of all 1956 Michigan fishing licenses, except trout stamps, have dropped below 1955 levels.

Sales of temporary nonresident fishing permits showed some \$3,000 temporary nonresident licenses were purchased — a drop of 6.5 percent from sales during the same period last year.

Annual nonresident fishing license sales through September totaled 120,000, a decrease of 3.2 percent.

Resident license sales totaled

733,000 — 3.7 per cent below the 1955 level.

Meanwhile, trout stamp sales jumped to 181,000 for a 3.1 per cent increase over sales during the same period last year.

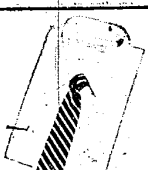
