The Farmington squad began to show signs of life late in the last quarter, but was held scoreless.


Clayton Graham, freshman coach, claims that the Fresh were "overconfident," and simply could not move the ball. He also blamed the loss on Farmington's "slow line."

Falcons Start Too Late To Catch Up With Berkley, Lose Contest 26-12

The Bears of Berkley won their first game in two years, dousing the Farmington Falcons, 26-12, in last Friday night's grid contest at Berkley.

Lacking offensive power in the first half, the Falcons could not successfully move the ball across the all-important line. In the second half, they showed the necessary drive, but could not catch the Berkley Bears, who had romped off a four-touchdown lead before the Falcons could get going.

The Bears scored their first touchdown halfway through the first quarter on a run by Bob Berg. The extra point was booted by Herb Duncan.

The Falcons fumbled twice in the second quarter, and each time the Bears pushed the ball down the field and across the goal line.

The first score of the second half was racked up by Berkley climaxing a 77 yard drive. Berg again pushed across, but Duncan's extra was off center.

At this late point in the game the Falcons began to click. Sparked by the running of Mike Agee and Tom Kosty, they drove from their own 38 and scored on a run by Kosty. The extra point was no good.

Berkley's third touchdown was scored as a result of the Falcons' second fumble, which was on their own 16 yard line. Franz Neubrecht bucked across the line for Berkley. Duncan's kick for the extra point was blocked.

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Thurston JVs Beat Trojans

Clareneville's Junior Varsity grid team met the Junior Varsity squad from Thurston, October 16, at home, and lost out in the contest, 12-6.

In the first quarter, Thurston drove around end for a 10 yard gain and a touchdown score. The Trojans blocked the extra point attempt, however.

During the second quarter play, Clareneville's Jon Nelson took the ball over on a 5 yard run. This was the only Clareneville score of the game. The Thurston defense blocked the extra point kick.

In the fourth quarter, a Thurston back took the ball over a spectacular 40 yard run. This TD, plus an extra point kick, gave Thurston a 12-6 lead and the contest.

Falcon JV's Win Over Walled Lake

The Falcon J.V. football squad romped to a 20-0 victory over the Walled Lake J.V.

The first quarter went scoreless. Then, in the second quarter Dick Byrne took a pass from Alan Le Sage and ran for F.H.S.'s first touchdown. The extra point try was no good. At the end of the half Farmington led 6-0.

In the third quarter Farmington scored on Byrne's run from the 45 yard line. He also scored the extra point.

Byrne tallied again in the fourth quarter from the 50 yard line and Tom Grimshaw ran for the extra point.

The J.V.'s record for the season is one win and three losses.

Cigarettes Cause Many Fires, But A Poor Source

Why do cigarettes cause so many fires?

What fabrics and other materials will a cigarette ignite most easily?

Do certain conditions make a cigarette especially dangerous?

To find the answers to these questions, the office of California's state marshal recently conducted a series of tests.

Lighted cigarettes were dropped into wastebaskets and boxes filled with various types of rubbish and dried vegetation, and fanned to make conditions most favorable for burning. They were puffed near flammable liquids and gases, and pinched so their glowing coals fell through flammable vapors.

They were laid on samples of natural and plastic materials commonly used for clothing, decoration and upholstery, and on samples of padding and cushioning, and left to burn until they went out.

The results of the tests were surprising. Because, although some materials burned, and some covers exploded, cigarettes proved on the whole to be a relatively poor source of ignition, able to start fires only under limited conditions.

How, then, can cigarettes be one of the top causes of fires? The answer is—by sheer numbers!

In 1955, more than 400 billion cigarettes were smoked—about 780,000 a minute. At that rate, it would take only one cigarette in 2 million to cause 200,000 fires a year.

New Whirlpool Now In Operation

The purchase of the new whirlpool, which was the project of the F.H.S. Varsity Club this year, has been completed and installed in the first aid room of the boys' locker room.

The purpose of the whirlpool, approximately \$725, is to increase the circulation around injured body areas. This in turn hastens the removal of the damaged tissue. The continuous flow of warm water, which is thermostatically controlled, and air soothe injured or pulled muscles.

The whirlpool consists of a large stainless steel tub and an electric motor which pumps both water and air in a circular motion.

Mr. Jack Cotton, F.H.S. athletic director, stated that this is one of the most advanced types of equipment available.

Warm Weather Cuts Duck Bags

Indian summer may be warmly welcomed by most people, but it has ruined many a day this year for Michigan duck hunters, says the Conservation Department.

Unseasonably warm weather is blamed for the poor to fair waterfowl hunting generally reported throughout the state during the early weeks of the season.

Avid marsh hunters slightly refer to Indian summer as "butterfly weather," or "bluebird weather" while yearning for the cold, blustery days which mean ducks are on the move.

For example, hunters at Pointe Mouillee state game area bagged only 1425 ducks during the first 14 days of the October 1 - December 9 waterfowl season — compared with 2850 during the same period last year. Hunter numbers during the two weeks at the popular Lake Erie hunting area were about the same as in 1955.

Waterfowl specialists explain that ducks spend much of their time out on the open water of Lake Erie in mild weather and don't head for the marshes unless the weather is rough.

Some flight ducks have been reported at Saginaw Bay and Houghton Lake, but not in large numbers and are not offering much shooting.

Attendance High At Kensington

Kensington Metropolitan Park near New Hudson broke all attendance records for the past summer despite the weather and is already ahead of its previous all-time high for one year, according to a report on park use compiled by the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority.

Indian summer has brought a decided upswing in visitors at Kensington which set a record on October 14 with 21,000.

"Only our beaches reflected the poor season of which resort owners complained," Kenneth L. Hallenbeck, Authority director, said. While use of swimming facilities at Metropolitan Beach on Lake St. Clair and on Kent Lake in Kensington Park fell some 16 percent below 1955, the use of other facilities soared."

"With two and one-half months to go, it is still possible that we may cap one million or even top the 1955 figure of 1,077,903, especially if ice fishing begins early," he said.

FHS Places Second In Cross Country

Farmington's cross country team placed second with 54 points in the Inter-Lakes conference meet held at Hickory Hills Golf Course, October 18.

Walled Lake High with 42 points was in first place. The other teams participating were Van Dyke with 99 points, Berkley with 100 points, Southfield with 103 points and Watford with 110 points.

Jerry Young of Berkley set a record with a time of 10:56.

Farmington's Dick O'Conner placed third in the meet with a time of 11:06. Jim Marsh placed ninth, George Bartram thirteenth, and Dewey Nichols eighteenth.

Farmington's next meet will be with the Clareneville invitational October 23.
