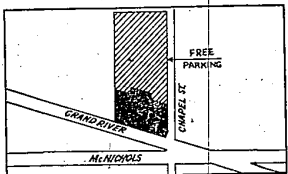

Oakland Citizens League Rates Candidates

A rating of candidates for Oakland County offices, Congress and the State Legislature for whom you will vote on November 6 was released last week by the Oakland Citizens League, Inc.

The Oakland County Citizens League, which was founded in 1937, is a non-partisan organization set up for the promotion of a better understanding of the problems of citizenship and their solution in the County. The League office is located at 503 Community Bank Building, Pontiac.

It should be pointed out that the ratings given the various candidates for offices by the Citizens League do not necessarily conform with the ratings this newspaper might give to candidates. Dedicated to a policy of non-partisanship, we refrain from making any effort to rate candidates or lean our support toward any candidate in our news columns. As has been emphasized on numerous occasions in the past, we will attempt at all times to supply as much factual information as possible about political candidates, letting our readers decide for themselves whom they feel is best qualified to serve.

William S. Broomfield (R.), Royal Oak, and Paul Sutton (D.), Royal Oak, have both been given three-star ratings in the evaluation of candidates and issues for the November 6 election.

Party nominees selected in the August primary for Oakland County offices, Congress and the State Legislature are rated by the Citizens League on the basis of personal interviews and other data. The more stars given a candidate the better qualified he is for office, in the Citizens League's opinion. Ratings are made regardless of party affiliation, as a public service to voters.

The Citizens League recommended a "Yes" vote on the 1937 issue which will be on the November 6 ballot. This is a proposed amendment to the state constitution which seeks to relieve the legislature of the responsibility of deciding whether to seal persons convicted of subversion or a felony involving a breach of public trust.
