

Hearing Required To Get Federal Aid For New Road

The State Highway Department has taken steps to comply with provisions of the Federal Highway Act of 1955, which requires hearings to be held before Federal Aid funds can be obligated for any construction work involving routes passing through or by-passing any incorporated or unincorporated city or village. Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler has announced. The Commissioner says that Joseph E. Wilbur, former District 7 construction engineer at Kalamazoo, has been transferred to Lansing as an assistant to the Department's Deputy Commissioner, Chief Engineer, Carlos Weber, and will be responsible for making the arrangements for and conducting such hearings.

Daily Grind Helps Health For Aged

Men may not like their daily grind at the office, but it may do wonders to preserve their health, according to a University of Michigan expert in problems of aging. One of the principal problems of persons who retire, says Wilbur T. Donahue, is the relief from pressure and routine of business life. This often results in a vague feeling of malaise—a sense that something's wrong, even though no specific symptoms of sickness are present. In part, she adds, this feeling may be traced to changes in the body's delicate chemical balance. "Many of us may awaken in the morning feeling tired and blue," she says. "The retired person may remember an interesting assignment or event that's coming up; we perk up and regain our sense of well-being. The retired person may lack this stimulus and remain in the dumps all day."



Reason For Surge In Ownership Of Homes Cited

You need less money than you probably imagine to buy a home today. Thanks to mortgage insurance you often can buy a home for less than you pay in a mortgage. This is the opinion of the editors of a leading national magazine. This has been the major factor in boosting home ownership from 40 to 60 per cent of the population since World War II, it is reported. Except that former servicemen can borrow a little more money a bit cheaper, no government subsidy and no social welfare advantages are cited for this far-reaching development. A million families a year can become home owners because of a mechanism called mortgage insurance, a device whereby Uncle Sam signs the mortgage papers along with the buyer and protects the seller against loss, it is pointed out.

TIMELY SHOPPING TIPS GIVEN BY LEADING AUTHORITY

Frosty nights are steadily taking their toll of homegrown produce. Already tomatoes, cucumbers and corn are becoming more scarce and of poorer quality, yet there are many other plentiful foods to fill the market basket. Good supplies of green cabbage are among the best values in vegetables, says the Consumer Education Information Agent, Mrs. Josephine Lawyer. Hand-weighting is a good way to choose a head of cabbage, for the best head is solid, firm and heavy for its size. As the fall crop of potatoes is harvested, shoppers will find fine quality and size, and best of all, really economical prices. Most Michigan potatoes are now selling for about half the cost of those shipped in from other states. The fruit basket is brimming with Michigan apples varying in color from green to yellow to rosy red. McIntosh is in best supply for hand eating. There are plenty of Crispin apples for pies or Wolf Rivers for baking. Mrs. Lawyer said. Wealthies are the best all purpose apples at present. This is the first year in several that a many Concord grapes are being sold on retail counters. Since the crop is over twice as large as last year, there are more chops have better flavor, aroma, texture and tenderness than chops broiled to the same internal temperature.

Kitchen Chores Teen-Age Gripe A Century Ago

What did teen-agers gripe about a hundred years ago? The pattern of complaint may have changed a bit but moods and temperament were about the same. It appears from the diary of Elizabeth Gurney Taylor, now in the possession of the University of Michigan Historical Collection. Sixteen-year-old "Lizzie," who lived on a farm near Three Rivers, wrote in her diary on February 10, 1857: "The girls went to the schoolhouse out to be punished but I must stay home to let Clara (her sister) go. "Oh dear, as it goes, I never can do a thing, never can have anything, never can go to school, never can take the parts I ought to take in the exercises because we haven't a hired girl! Plague take it all!" "I feel so out of patience I don't know what to do. Busy in the kitchen all day and stay home at night because we haven't got any hired girl! Ruin my hands by washing dishes and cleaning spoons when I ought to be at school, because we haven't got any hired girl!" "Well, there's no use making a fuss over it. As I see it, I've got to sport with my pots and kettles instead of my piano, till because we haven't got any hired girl!" "A few days later we find from the diary that Lizzie has escaped from the kitchen but finds dancing school slightly less than perfect. She writes, "Had a very pleasant dancing school but my pleasure was considerably damped. The latter part of the evening, the best set we danced. Mr. Shull let the ladies select their partners. "When he called my number, I started, got half way across the floor and discovered I could not dance. They all looked at me from another, I was so near-sighted. Then Jim Dressler offered to introduce me to Mr. Doxtator so dance with him. I felt pretty good. So much for being near-sighted," she concludes. "There are still some old-fashioned mothers who love to tuck their children in bed, but many of those cast away their old-fashioned kids come home."—Galen Drake.

The new highway act, which greatly increases the amount of Federal aid highway funds for Michigan and other states, requires that hearings be held on all proposed routes of new highways in which Federal funds are to be expended. Transcripts of the hearings will be forwarded to the Bureau of Public Roads for review. If the Bureau then approves of the proposed route, Federal Aid funds will then be assured for the projects.

Seek Eyeglasses For World's Needy

One of the country's most unusual charities recently announced its 1955-1957 goal from its headquarters at Short Hills, New Jersey. A goal of collecting 350,000 old eyeglasses was set recently by New Eyes for the Needy, Inc., a nonprofit, nonsectarian organization of 40 local women dedicated to helping others help themselves by making it possible for them to see normally. The old glasses are not the cost of new, individually fitted, prescription lenses for thousands of poor people who cannot afford them. The metal is melted down and sold and the proceeds pay for a single new pair, they point out.

Pork, Veal Needs Long, Moist Cooking Time

If you were to make a list of meats that can be broiled, you might be tempted to include fresh pork and veal, according to M.S.U. foods specialists. They suggest that you might better braise these two meats. Although pork chops and pork steaks are tender and contain very little connective tissue, broiling and pan-broiling are not the best ways to cook them. Pork requires thorough cooking to bring out its full flavor. Comparative tests have shown that braised pork chops have better flavor, aroma, texture and tenderness than chops broiled to the same internal temperature.

While most meat prices are steady to higher at this season, one group remains at an economical low for everyone to enjoy. The variety meats such as heart, liver, tongue and kidneys offer flavor changes and different ways of preparation for cooler days. Since the variety meats do not keep well, they should be used within a short time after they are purchased. Mrs. Lawyer comments that they are within a day or two. The variation in beef costs is due to the difference in price between the range fed and the grain fed cattle. The range fed beef often referred to as baby beef, range fed calf, thrifty beef, economy or standard beef, is about 20 cents a pound less than the same grade quality cuts. There are still many small grades, but the medium sizes are increased. Both these sizes now represent a better value, ounce for ounce, than eggs, than the large and jumbo sizes of the same grade.

TIPS ON USING AUTOMATIC DRYER GIVEN BY AGENT

"It's not what you do, but the way you do it," is certainly applicable to using your automatic clothes dryer. To get the best service from it, Mary Hixon, Home Demonstration agent, suggests you do these things: 1. Make sure clothes are thoroughly rinsed before they go into the dryer. This prevents the possibility of yellowing from detergent left in the clothes. 2. Don't overload your dryer, she said. This increases the drying time, prevents uniform drying and causes clothes to wrinkle, making ironing more difficult. 3. Although a dryer, like a wash-water, dries eight or nine pounds (dry weight) of clothes, research shows that a lighter load of about six pounds washes better and gets less wrinkled. When the automatic dryer turns off, it pays to take out the clothes promptly to prevent wrinkles. Careful timing pays, too, because pre-drying clothes with wringers and use more electricity than necessary. 4. When you sort the clothes for the washer, Mrs. Hixon suggests, thinking ahead to the dryer, be sure you are consistent in transferring the load directly from washer to the dryer than to sort the damp load. 5. Consider the weight of the fabric for greater drying efficiency. Cases of hanging loads of Turkish towels or other heavy fabrics for example, take considerably longer in the dryer than lightweight nylons. The time needed for drying depends on the kind of fabric, the weight, the size of the load and the amount of moisture in the clothes. 6. If you wish to feel the dryness of clothes, put them into the dryer because they will feel moist in the dryer, Mrs. Hixon says. Remember that clothes don't have to get "bone dry" in the dryer. It's usually better for the fabric if they don't. Clothes come out hot and the heat left in them gives the final drying outside the dryer.
