Area Church Planning A Crisis, Challenge Research Indicates

Following is a report made by Raleigh Sain, director of research and church planning for the Detroit Council of Churches. He has been active both locally and nationally in cooperative efforts by city planners and church planners to meet the problems outlined in this article, the Detroit Regional Planning Commission indicated.

Protestant churches today face a crisis. Challenged by the rapid and ever-expanding development of new housing and increasing population of our urban centers, they have an opportunity unequalled in their history for church extension and the building of new missions and outposts.

Coincidental with this great opportunity is the apparent possibility of physical incapability in keeping up with the pace. Local churches and individual denominations already are finding it impossible, and, even cooperative efforts such as are conducted by the large majority of denominations through councils of churches are discovering that limited resources and innumerable problems threaten the achievement of their best plans.

The Detroit Council of Churches is the central agency in which approximately 85 per cent of Protestant church membership finds a means to give the cooperative service to the metropolitan area, which they cannot render alone. The Department of Research and Church Planning of this Council conducts the "mission extension work of the cooperating denominations."

Close liaison and working relations now exist between the department and both the Regional and the Detroit City Plan Commissions. These same relations also exist with many local planners, developers and realtors, and the department sincerely desires an ever-increasing cooperation with many more such groups and individuals.

A nationally accepted formula for new church extension; when applied to metropolitan Detroit, quickly spells out the challenge in this area. One Protestant church is needed for every 2,500 persons or 700 homes. Therefore, when the Regional Planning Commission estimates a population increase of 1,100,000 in the metropolitan area by 1970; this means 440 Protestant churches should be constructed, or an average of about 30 a year.

In order to accomplish such a goal, long-range planning and site selection is essential. Restrictions and zoning accentuate this need and in some measure increase the size of church property from lots to acres. Three to five acres are now normal requisites for church, parking, manse and improvement. Naturally it is economically feasible for churches to secure sites at acreage prices. Rapid growth of large housing developments and scarcity of suitable sites in improved subdivisions have pushed the frontier ever outward toward the rural fringe.

Faced with the unequalled challenge of such great expansion, major denominations, also are compelled by a moral principle—that "every community shall have a church and every church an adequate field." Adequate church property, then, and not under- or over-churching communities, is the goal of our Protestant churches. To reach the objective, the idea of "master-planning for churches," or including church sites in the master plan of developing communities seems a desirable procedure.
