State Forest Fires Burn Out 306 Acres

Fires damaged 306 acres of state and private forests and grasslands during the last week, swelling the damage total for the year to 3183 acres.

Of the 12 Conservation Department districts in the state, only the Escanaba district in the upper peninsula had a record of no fires during the week.

In the upper peninsula, six fires burned 102 acres. The northern lower peninsula reported 30 fires with damage to 77 acres, while 30 fires burned 127 acres in the southern lower peninsula.
