

Name 110 To F.H.S. Honor Roll

The Farmington High Honor Roll for the first marking period of the '56-'57 year consisted of only 110 out of the student body, about 11 per cent.

The failure list consisted of slightly over 22 per cent.

To be on the Honor Roll a student must have B or better marks in all classes, while the failure lists includes any student who has only a D or lower mark.

The freshman class had more students on the Honor Roll than any other group, with a total of 38; seniors, 36; sophomores, 20; juniors, 16.

Percentage-wise, however, the seniors were way out in front with 28.1 per cent of the class on the Honor Roll. They were followed by the freshmen, with 22.6 per cent of the freshmen, 8.7 per cent of the juniors, and 7.6 per cent of the sophomores.

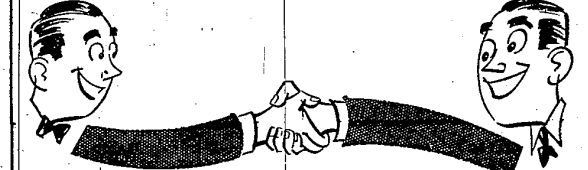
