TOWNSHIP BOARD

FEEDINGS

Regular Meeting, October 23, 1954.

At the regular meeting of the Farmington Township Board held on October 23, 1954, at the Farmington Township Hall with the following members present: Gains, Carins, Goers, Westlake, Harris, Tardy and Avery.

A letter was read from the Forest Hills Association on behalf of the property owners of Forest Hills Sub., reporting the unsatisfactory condition of the property occupied and owned by Miss Olga Rice at 2535 Edgemoor Dr.

It was moved by Harris and supported by Avery that Mr. Gains investigate this condition and that the Township Board take whatever legal action necessary to abate this condition. Motion carried.

It was moved by Avery and supported by Goers that the Township Board approve the additional name, — Edna Siler, to the SDN license by Kenneth Siler. Motion carried.

It was moved by Harris and supported by Avery that we send a registered letter to the Liquor Control Commission objecting to the issuance of a SDN license to Stephen Zakarias, with a copy of this letter to go to the Attorney General. Motion carried.

It was moved by Harris and supported by Goers that the Township install a deep well pump on the George Plant property as per agreement with the Fred West Drilling Co. Motion carried.

Mr. Gains stated at this time that the water survey would be delayed because Southfield decided to put five sections in, instead of one.

The following resolution was presented by Avery and supported by Westlake: "That the Farmington Township Board appoint a committee to initiate action to set up a water and sewer dept.—this committee to consist of three members from the Township Board and three interested parties from the Township." Carried.

Thompson Bros. Co. presented a plan consisting of 110 acres located on the south side of Fourteen Mile Road, a part of the N² Sec. 5 of Farmington Township with a total of 160 lots to be known as Woodbrook Sub.

Moved by Westlake and supported by Tardy that the Plat of Woodbrook be referred to the Planning Board for their study and recommendations. Carried.

Moved by Westlake and supported by Harris that Mr. Leonard be authorized to draw up a resolution giving the Canvaser Bros. permission to remove sand from Edin Hills Sub.—Mr. Leonard to present resolution at the next regular meeting of the Township Board. Carried.

Moved by Avery and supported by Gains that the proposed rezoning of Lots 1, 2, 3, 4 of Tarabusi Roseland Gardens Sub. be turned by Harris that the Township Board consider their study and recommendations. Carried.

Moved by Harris and supported by Goers that the Clerk be given authority to sign the plat for Drake Heights Sub. after the Oakland County Road Commission has given their approval. Carried.

It was moved by Tardy and supported by Harris that the Township purchase an explosive meter for testing natural or petroleum gases. Carried.

It was moved by Avery and supported by Harris that "Authority be given by the Township Board in the suit brought by the City of Farmington, being case C 28371, for the purpose of permitting the Township of Farmington to intervene as party plaintiff; said suit being filed to obtain an interpretation of certain language in the wills of C. Wilbur and Ruth Carlin, in which the District Library is concerned. Further, that resolution be made retro-active to October 16, 1954." Carried.

It was moved by Tardy and supported by Goers that the Township purchase office equipment necessary for water billing. Motion carried.

On motion the meeting adjourned.

cerned with an interpretation of the word "obscene." The difficulty arises when trying to define which specific books and under what specific conditions books can be described in this manner.

Behind the local conflict there are several basic issues. For example, how can one live in a country that provides freedom of speech and yet must recognize social responsibility? What factors must be considered to determine if a book should be banned? Who shall have the power to ban books? How great will this power be? These are the real questions the courts must decide.
