## Weak Offensive Costs FHS Games

Final statistics released by the Farmington High athletic department on the football season just completed bore up the fact pointed out in the past, that lack of offensive might was the direct result of many of their losses during the season.

A bright spot in the team's offensive attack was the brilliant running of Tom Kosty, who carried the pigskin a total of 57 times for 392 yards or an average of 6.9 yards per try. Also deserving mention is the running of Mike Agee and Lewis McLellan. McLellan, who carried 48 times, picked up 213 yards for an average of 4.4 yards a try. Agee, only a sophomore, carried 61 times for 245 yards and a 4-yard average gain per try.

A far-from-exceptional passing attack was led by Bob Brewbaker, who completed 13 of 37 passes at a tempo of 161 yards and an average of 12.4 yards per try. Brewbaker was Jones led in yards gained on the receiving end, picking up 103.

In the scoring department, Kosty passed the way, carrying over four times, followed by McLellan with two and Jones and Don MacDonald with one each.

Mention must also be given to the stellar punting of Agee. He booted the Falcons out of trouble 20 times and averaged 35.2 yards a boot. Except for the twenty-first attempted boot, which was blocked, this average would have been much higher.

## Cross Country Team Take 4th In State Class B

Farmington High's cross-country team ran strong last Saturday in place fourth in the Class B State Finals at the Washenaw Golf Course near Ypsilanti.

The meet began at 10:30 a.m. with the class C and D schools getting off to a fast but soggy start. At 11 a.m. the contestants from the class B schools took their places at the line and were soon off into the early fog. First in the Class B finals was Portage, in second spot was River Rouge, and in third place was Walled Lake.

Dick O'Conner, Farmington High senior, took state honors by placing seventh in a field of over 100 other runners representing schools from all parts of the state. O'Conner's time for the two miles run was 10:55.

In second place for Farmington was Jim Marsh with a time of 11:13, giving him 21st place in the meet. Following Marsh were George Barnum in 45th place, Warren Cawley in 58th, and 8th place was Dewey Nichols. The 21st points thus acquired assured the thinlinds a fourth spot in their class.

This wound up the '56 cross-country season for Mr. Gene Freed's team. Much of the credit for this record should go to the '56 captain, Don Shuster. Shuster has put forth much effort for the team even though he has been unable to run in the last several meets because of a heart condition.
