Two In Area
To Have Art
Works Shown

Two from the Farmington area, Sam Cashman of 21325 Rensselaer, and Cecile McNeill of 33479 Alta Loma, will have works displayed at the forty-seventh annual Michigan Artists' Exhibition opening Tuesday evening, November 13, at the Detroit Institute of Arts. Included will be 270 works of art by 230 artists, 114 of them from Detroit and 119 from out-state.

Cashman will have displayed sculptures "Mother and Child" and "Annunciation" and McNeill, the oil painting, "Moth."

This year's selection was chosen from 1808 entries, including 169 oil and water color paintings, 42 pieces of sculpture, 29 lithographs, other prints and drawings and 30 photographs. The photography section is the largest it has been since photographs were first admitted to the exhibit in 1953.

Winners of 28 prizes totaling more than \$3500 will be announced at a banquet for exhibiting artists in the Institute's Rotunda Hall, preceding the opening view and public reception in the Great Hall beginning at 8:30 o'clock.

The exhibition will continue through December 23. Most of the works will be for sale at studio prices, it was indicated.

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
