Church Education Dignitary To Talk Here Nov. 14

Reverend Edna P. Bruner, associate director, field workers and educational consultant for the Division of Education, The Council of Liberal Churches (Universalist-Unitarian), Inc., Boston, Massachusetts, will address parents and teachers of the Universalist Church in Farmington on Wednesday, November 14, at 8:00 p.m. in the local church. This meeting will be open to the public.

Born in Olinda, Ontario, Miss Bruner was educated in the schools there, and received a B.A. degree from St. Lawrence University in Canton, New York. She received her B.D. degree from the Theological School of St. Lawrence University, and was ordained to the Universalist Ministry. From 1920 to 1940 she was minister of the First Universalist Church, Waterloo, Iowa. In 1940, she became general field worker for the Universalist Church of America and from 1945 to 1951 was minister of the First Universalist Church, Canton, New York, home of St. Lawrence University and its Theological School.

Miss Bruner has had special interest in the church's educational program. For three years, she was dean of the Universalist Mid-West Institute, at Bridgman, Michigan, and has directed or taught at other institutes throughout the Universalist denomination. Interested in strengthening the voice and skill of liberalism, Miss Bruner served on the Universalist-Unitarian Commissions whose work resulted in the new Council of Liberal Churches.
