Final Preparations For Staging Of Play "Lo And Behold" Being Made

Final preparations are now being completed for presentation of the rib-tickling comedy "Lo and Behold" by the Farmington Players this weekend at the Junior High School auditorium on Thomas Street.

The play will be presented on Friday and Saturday evenings, November 16 and 17 with the curtain going up at 8:30 p.m. A matinee will be offered on Sunday, November 18 with curtain time at 3:30 p.m.

This will mark the eighth production to be put on by the local Player group since it was organized four years ago.

The lead role in the play is taken by Allen Thayer. He plays the part of an invalid, short tempered author who deliberately commits suicide by eating a meal against his doctor's orders which is highly indigestible for his condition. His plan in doing this is to return as a spirit to haunt his old home in peace.

This plan goes awry when he is accompanied on his return as a spirit by three other ghosts whom he is unable to shake off despite all efforts. Ruth Nanz, as "Daisy," the substitute maid who cooks the famous author the meal which causes his death, and DeForest Walton, the author's doctor, supply the love interest which is meddled into constantly by the ghosts. The three ghosts accompanying the author's ghost to earth are the Indian maid (Betty Road), the Southern belle (Marcia Thayer) and the mad musician (Wesley Orr).

Daisy's former cast-off friend, McDougal, played by H. V. DeWells, shows up at the wrong time to further complicate matters.

Following the meeting, refreshments were served.

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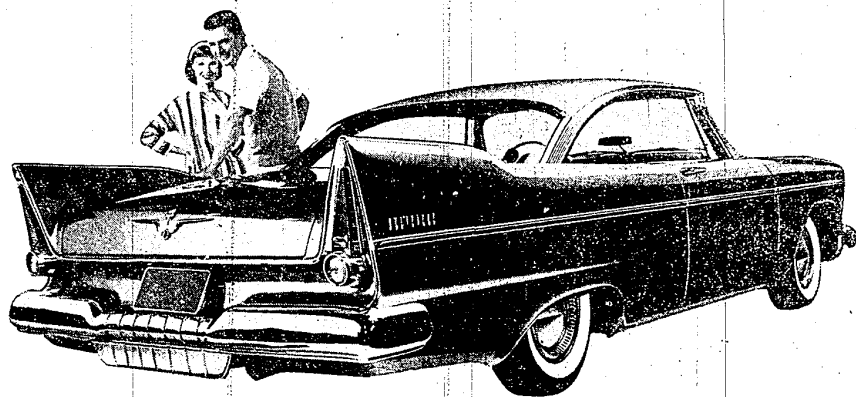
