Two suspensions of operations were announced by the Michigan Department of Agriculture. They were the first such penalties in

several years.

One company was ordered to keep its products off the market for 10 days because they showed insufficient amounts of protein. The other suspension was for two days. This was the penalty against the company whose product showed excess water, ascorbic acid, cereal and stomach tissue in cold meats. Recommended procedure for people who want to be sure they have sausage products prepared according to highest standards, says the Michigan Department of Agriculture, is for them to always buy products made within state boundaries.


