Board (Continued from Page 1A) now be considered. It was generally felt that a site in this vicinity would be suitable if a means for safely walking across the new Grand River expressway to the school could be provided. A footbridge crossing of the expressway at either Power or Parker Avenues was proposed some time ago. A check will be made to determine whether this footbridge is still being considered or whether a decision for or against it has already been made. Since a school located here would still be within a mile of the most residents living in the city south of Grand River and east of Farmington Road, youngsters would be able to walk to and from the school, it was pointed out. A resident of Alta Loma Subdivision raised the question as to whether location of a school on the east side of Gill Road just south of the Old Quaker Cemetery had been considered. They indicated that a school here had been considered but that no site could be obtained. It was pointed out that children living in that vicinity would probably continue to be enrolled at the Gill Road School until such time as additional elementary schools are built to the west, nearer the city. Peter Tarapata, representing the architectural firm for the new Junior High School, gave a report and recommendation for the awarding of a contract on the installation of kitchen equipment at the school. Acting on his recommendation the Board awarded the contract to the Canton Equipment and China Company. Change orders on unnecessary items for the kitchen were also approved, reducing the cost for the total project to approximately \$25,000. A request from D. A. Winnie, representing residents of Franklin Knolls, that the School Board go on record as being opposed to the location of a chain food store at Middlebelt and 14 Mile Road in the vicinity of the Eagle School was discussed at length. The Board agreed that they would go on record as being opposed to the store. They also indicated that letters would be directed to both the Farmington and West Bloomfield Township Boards expressing the School Board's opposition to any type of commercial development at the undeveloped corners at the intersection. An administrative request that the School District make application for Federal Aid was unanimously approved by the Board. A survey was recently made through the schools to determine the number of parents working in businesses having federal government contracts. If the number so employed is determined sufficient by the Federal Government the School District will be qualified to receive some Federal School Aid money, it was indicated. In other action, the Board approved the granting of sick leave time to school matrons and cafeteria employees and authorized approval on all blacktopping jobs recently completed at various schools in the School District.
