


Oil is being produced on 18 million acres of leased land in the United States. In addition, the industry has under lease about 300 million, non-producing acres that may prove productive in the near future.





Estimate 430,000 Deer Hunters Now Afield In State

About 430,000 hunters are now afield for the opening of deer season today, Thursday, November 16, with 215,000 in the northern lower peninsula, 200,000 in the upper peninsula and the remainder in the southern lower peninsula, the conservation department estimated.

Last year, early season blizzards upset a lot of hunting plans and caused a lower than normal season success. Conservation department biologists say hunters will take as many or more deer than the 65,000 bagged in regular season last year.

The department also estimated that about 15,000 deer will be taken in the "any deer" season being held in 22 scattered trouble spots where deer are too numerous for food supplies, or where they are causing damage to farm and fruit crops.

Two of these special seasons—in Lake and Newaygo counties and on Bois Blanc Island—are running concurrent with the regular season. The others will be held December 1 and 2, after the close of the regular season.


