EXPLAINING the installation and operation of the new built-in vacuum cleaning system introduced to the public recently and now being offered for installation by a local dealer is F. R. Johnson, president of the company which developed and is now manufacturing the product.

### New Built-In Cleaning System Being Offered Area Housewives

A new and highly revolutionary product to greatly lighten the work load of the busy homemaker is now being offered residents of the area by the Electric Maid Company established recently by Bud King, 23200 Valleyview Drive, Farmington.

The new product, developed and manufactured by the Simpson Corporation of Dearborn, is a complete built-in vacuum cleaning system which replaces the conventional vacuum cleaner, dust-mop and dust-mat, mop and scrub bucket. In addition, it takes the work out of drapery dusting, rug and upholstery shampooing, and picking up spilled or tracked-in water as well as doing other cleaning chores, King said.

The new device has no dustbin to empty or dispose of, no filters to clog and heavy suction unit, no drag about the house. The suction unit, driven by a motor much bigger than that on an ordinary vacuum cleaner, and a motor-driven hose can be installed in the basement, a utility room or a closet, King added.

In the living room or at some other central location in the house recessed behind a wall panel can be kept the cleaning wand and the terminal tools, it was indicated. A special switch on the handle turns the motor and plays out or withdraws hose as needed with housewife having to handle only the lightweight wand.

All dirt, dust and liquids picked up by the nozzle are ejected with a stream of water into the sewer through a permanently removing dirt from the house and leaving air much cleaner. Between-cleaning dusting are practically eliminated, company officials said.

One of the cleaning tools is a scrub brush - squeegee combination. For scrubbing kitchen or bathroom floors the homemaker need merely to splash soapy water on the floor, scrub it with the brush tool, and then flip the tool over to dry the floor instantly. 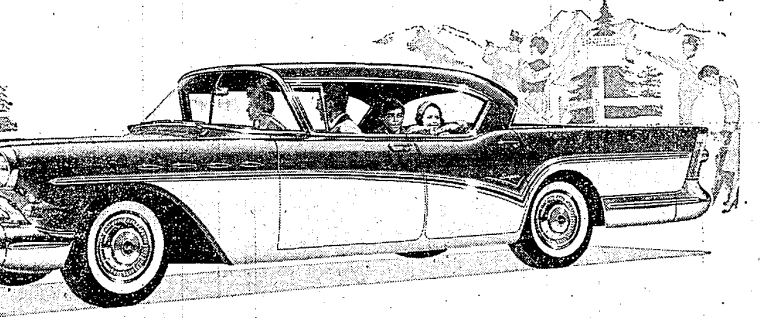
The public has been extended a cordial invitation to attend. The program will start at 12:30 p.m. and continue through the afternoon.

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
