TOWNSHIP ZONING HEARING SET FOR DECEMBER 5

A public hearing on two proposed amendments to the township zoning ordinance will be held Wednesday evening, December 5, at the Town Hall, according to Edward Schmidt, chairman of the zoning board.

The first proposal concerns the rezoning of Brookside Park Subdivision, Eight Mile Road, just west of Middlebelt Road, from Residential Two to Residential Three. The rezoning would effect the entire subdivision, with the exception of a strip of land along Eight Mile Road, which would remain commercial.

The second proposal involves the proposed rezoning of Lots 1 and 2 of Supervisor's Ten Mile Middlebelt Plat from Residential Four to Commercial.
