Tickets are now available from any member of the Farmington Township Lions Club and at several business places in the community for the forthcoming appearance of the famous Harlem Globetrotters basketball team at the Farmington High School gymnasium on Sunday, December 2, at 8 p.m.

Business places now having tickets for purchase are Cranston Point Shop, Gambles Store, Bob Harris Carpets and Terry's Hardware. Tickets will also be available at the door the night of the contest.

The Globetrotters will display their basketball wizardry against the Washington Generals, famous for their hustle and well-coordinated style of play. In the last 30 years, the Globetrotters have lived up to their name by covering thousands of miles on the world's byways. They became the first basketball team to disorganize the regular basketball season and play the year-round.

During the past year the Trotters played 172 games in the United States and won them all, in addition to playing 150 games overseas. Heat and cold don't seem to bother their brand of play. In Guayaquil, Ecuador, they played in a 95-degree heat at 3,000 feet above sea level on one night and the next night in Quito, Ecuador, at 9,000 feet above sea level with the temperature around 45 degrees.

They held the claim of having played before more people in more places and having won more games than any other athletic team. Their record shows well over 5,000 victories with 303 defeats.

To celebrate their thirtieth anniversary they will bring to Farmington on Sunday their own original version of the game of basketball, it was indicated. The sponsoring organization, the Lions club, has been promised that they will display a rounded combination of both com-

edy and high caliber, fast-moving play for local fans. A colorful half-time show has also been promised. Featured will be Jimmy and Yvonne Garner in a tumbaline act, Richard Bergman and Bernie Bukiet in a table tennis act, and the hoop manipulation artistry of Ray Wilbert. All proceeds from the program will go toward the continuance of worthwhile charitable projects, including aid to the blind and partially blind.

Conservation Department law enforcement officials remind hunters that it is unlawful to smoke game out of dens, holes or nests.

Department enforcement personnel point out that this practice is illegal and also creates a serious fire hazard.

State law makes it unlawful to "destroy, disturb, or molest at any time any beaver, muskrat, raccoon, squirrel, mink, badger, or rabbit house, hole, burrow, nest, den or den," or to use smoke in taking or attempting to take any wild bird or animal.

Accident Rates Per Miles Traveled Reduced

A group of safety experts reported that the accident rate on America's streets and highways in twenty years had been reduced from 16 to 6.4 per hundred million miles of vehicle travel.

This report was made at a recent meeting of fifty of the nation's leaders in safety education, automotive manufacturing, traffic enforcement and other phases of motor safety.

It was indicated that if the 1936 accident rate were still to prevail, we would be killing substantially in excess of 100,000 people a year. Actually, 1956 seems likely to set a total of around 42,000.

The picture is still not a cheerful one, however, it was reported. With peak production of 8,000,000 vehicles last year, and with an expected registration of 61,000,000 vehicles and 20,000,000 drivers this year, further complications to the attack on auto accidents have set in. The accident rate again appears to be on the upgrade, it was pointed out.

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
