Seek 100 State Police Recruits



Michigan State Police will open recruiting drive November 21 to enter 100 new troopers.

Two entrance examinations have been scheduled by the State Civil Service Commission. Applications for the first must be in before 5 p.m. December 19, and for the second, at 5 p.m., January 30.

Candidates are advised, however, that to assure entrance into the training schools before May 1, applications must be in for the first examination. Applicants for the second examination will probably have to wait until after that date before entering training.

Increases granted by Civil Service during the last year have made the trooper's job among the most highly paid in the police service. According to length of service, pay in the trooper's rank alone ranges up \$5,004 a year. In addition, subsistence pay of \$900 a year is received and, at the end of six years of service, longevity pay which increases with the length of service.

The trooper also gets two paid vacations a year, lodging, uniforms and other equipment. At the end of 25 years of service he is eligible to retire on a pension equal to one-half his pay for the last two years of service, and this pension likewise goes to the widow.

Applicants must not be less than five feet, nine inches in height, be in good health and have a high school education or its equivalent.

Applications may be obtained at any State Police post or by writing to the State Civil Service Commission or the Michigan State Police at Lansing.

The 100 new troopers are being recruited to complete the enlistment of 168 additional men granted at the last regular session of the legislature.

(Continued from Page 1A) township are causing problems in any type of long range planning program. The Planning Committee requested this joint meeting for either November 26 or December 10.

A plat submitted by the Thompson-Brown Company for a subdivision between Drake and Highland Roads north of Thirteen Mile Road was recommended for approval to the Township Board following considerable discussion. A recommendation for approval by the township planning consultants was reversed following a lengthy clarification on details considered objectionable by the engineer for the subdivision project.

He indicated that if he had known the exact form in which plans were to be presented to the Planning Committee for approval, most of the objections indicated would have been eliminated. It was pointed out by the Planning Committee, and agreed to by the engineer, that similar cases causing delay and confusion could be avoided if subdivision regulations were in force.

A request for the rezoning of 80 feet of frontage on Farmington Road just south of the Dickie-Lou Market to commercial made a later was recommended for approval by the Township Board. It was the feeling of the Planning Committee that rezoning of the land would make possible off-street parking facilities and a better commercial corner there.

You haven't given much thought to what you would do in case of an automobile accident that did more than just crumple a fender.

For protecting your rights here are some basic rules which have been approved by the state police:

1. Stop. Never drive away—even from a minor bump—without checking to see if there are damages or injuries. If accident is serious, remain if possible until law enforcement officers arrive.
2. If anyone is seriously injured, get a doctor or an ambulance, whichever is quicker. Do not move the injured person in a way that can add to his injury. If he is lying on the ground, cover him from the neck down.
3. Get the other driver's name, address, car license number. Ask him to show you his driver's license and be prepared to show yours. Get the driver's license number.
4. Get the names and addresses of all persons involved in the accident, including passengers in your own and in other car.
5. Get the names of other witnesses and ask them how they saw the accident.
6. Make written notes on the scene. Be as exact as possible.
7. The accident must be reported immediately to the nearest police or sheriff's department. If the accident results in personal injury or death to any person. In some cities, any accident must be reported to the police.
8. See a doctor if you feel any after-effects. You can be seriously injured and not feel it at the moment.
9. If you carry automobile insurance, notify your agent promptly.
