Committee Studies School 'Drop Outs'

A special committee of school officials is conducting a study in the Farmington district regarding the problem of student drop-outs, Louis Schmidt, Superintendent, announced Monday.

The committee spent all day Monday conferring with teachers, counselors, and administrators in connection with the problem. They also checked class schedules, enrollments and visited classes during the day. Schmidt stated that drop-outs in the Farmington district are no greater than in any other areas, but "we are anxious to do what we can to reduce the problem."

Members of the special committee include: Dr. Wesley Erbe, University of Michigan; Dr. Richard Draeger, Detroit Public Schools; Miss Ruth Hartke, Dearborn Public Schools; Dr. George E. Myers, Michigan State University and Dr. Philip Prout, Department of Public Instruction. Dr. Myers is serving as chairman of the committee and Dr. Prout is secretary.

(Continued from Page 1A) Linc. increase of 25c per month. All message units now at 4c would be increased to 5c.

Installation and move charges, extra directory listings, and some other miscellaneous services would also be increased. The increase for most services largely reflect the increased number of telephones in the local calling area.

The requested revenue increase would approximate \$12,500,000 a year, 52% which will go to the Federal Government in taxes. Since the last rate adjustment, Maurer said the company's total wage costs have gone up \$13,000,000 a year. Nearly \$10,000,000 of these added payroll costs, he said, are applicable to the company's intrastate services and should be covered by rates for such services. He pointed out that other costs of doing business also have gone up, such as taxes, materials and supplies.

"Our request would be to be substantially higher if we had not realized significant economies in operating the business," Maurer said. While operating revenues have climbed 10% over last year, operating expenses have gone up 15% and the average investment per telephone has continued to climb.

"Michigan Bell," Maurer stated, "is not now earning and cannot earn a fair return with existing rates. Our responsibility for providing good service entails the larger construction program in its history, largely financed by investors who would hesitate to put their money into an enterprise unless it yields a good return on investment. In 1955, we spent nearly \$50,000,000 for new construction and, for the first 9 months this year, the outlay has exceeded \$58,500,000. In 1957, it is expected that we will spend more than \$58,000,000."

"Even with this proposed increase, the price of telephone service for most of our customers will have gone up less than half as much as most other things. And telephone service still will be one of the real bargains in our economy."
