Two Fires Cause Extensive Damage

Two fires were reported last week in Farmington Township, both resulting in considerable damage.

The first occurred Sunday in the A. & J. Market, a small grocery store on Inkster Road just north of Eight Mile. An overheated oil burner in the boiler ignited a wall of wood structure. One side of the store was almost totally destroyed, as was a major portion of the roof of the building. Firemen battled the blaze for almost two hours.

Around noon another fire broke out around the home of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Trucker at 30845 Ridgeway Drive. The floor under the furnace was burned out and considerable damage was done in the utility room. Considerable smoke damage resulted from the fire. Loss was estimated at around \$2,000.
