Falcons JV's Lose Opener To Livonia

In their opening contest of the season, the Farmington Falcon Junior Varsity cage team fell to the Bentley High JV team of Livonia, 49-39.

Although outplaying the Livonia five in the second half, the Falcons could never come back from their first half lag when they displayed little scoring ability. By the end of the first quarter, the Livonia lads had piled up a 14-4 lead and kept up an almost equal pace in the second quarter to leave the floor at half-time with a 25-13 lead.

During the first half, Coach Clayton Graham substituted freely and used a total of three different teams.

The third quarter was a see-saw battle with both teams racking in 13 points to make the score 38-23 in favor of Bentley at the end of the period.

In the final stanza the Falcons JV's showed plenty of spark, but were able to cut away only three points away from the Livonia boys' lead.

Falcons Edged By Bentley Five In Opening Game

In a low scoring contest Friday night opening the 1956-57 basketball season for the Farmington Falcons they were edged out by the Bentley Bulldogs, 36-30.

Both teams employed a tight type of zone defense which can partially account for the low scoring contest. More important, however, is the fact that neither team was able to hit on a high percentage of its shots.

The teams played evenly in the first period with both picking up ten points. In the second quarter, the teams matched basket for basket until George King sunk a free shot to give the Bulldogs a one-point lead at half-time, 19-18.

Early in the third canto the Falcons took the lead but later in the period Bentley staged a rally to pull ahead by quarter's end, 27-24.

Continuing their surge early in the final period, the Bentley five racked in six more points while holding the Falcons. Farmington came back later in the period to add six more points themselves, and raise hopes for the F.H.S. but was unable to keep the rally going. Bentley added three more points in the closing minutes of the game to give them the six-point margin of victory.

Bud Jones and Don Macdonald shared scoring honors for the Falcons, racking in 12 points apiece. George King was the high scorer for the Bentley quintet.

This Friday night the Falcons will tangle with the Clarenceville Trojans in an inter-community rivalry contest at the Clarenceville gymnasium.

Trojans Trounce Oak Park, 57-24

In their season opening non-league contest Friday night the Clarenceville Trojans scored a 57-24 victory on their home court by trouncing the Oak Park Redskins.

The Trojan five grabbed an early lead and held it throughout the game.

Clarenceville was never in trouble after the first minute of play. They led at half time 29-11. The final quarter was played by CHS reserves.

Larry Andrews paced the Trojans with 20 points while co-captains Dale Devitt and Dave Hanford each hit for 10. High man for the Oak Park Redskins was Miles with 10 points.

Friday night the Trojans will play host to Farmington in another non-league game. Clarenceville will open conference play on their home court Friday, December 11, against Holly.

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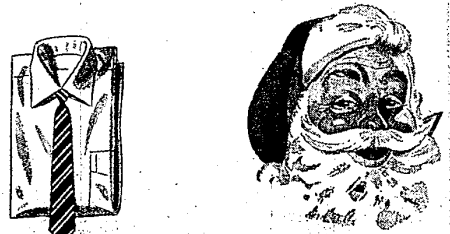
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
