Letters will be delivered again from Santa Claus this year to children all over the country through the courtesy of Pan American World Airways, it was disclosed recently.

To maintain the Santa Claus illusions of the young, a letter has been produced and signed personally by Santa Claus bearing a special cancellation post mark "North Pole Station, Fairbanks, Alaska." nearest post office to the North Pole.

Last year more than 10,000 Michigan children found such letters in their mail boxes just before Christmas.

Here's how to go about enlivening the Christmas season for the young or the old:

1. Writing paper and envelopes with the Santa Claus imprint are available at the Detroit office of Pan American at 1231 Washington Boulevard or any authorized travel agent. It's free. Just go in and get it.
2. Write the letter on the stationery and sign it Santa Claus. Put the letter in the envelope and address it to your offspring, or if you have none, to the one next door. Don't forget to put a 6-cent airmail stamp on it.
3. In another envelope, mail the Santa letter or return it before December 15 to the Pan American office in Detroit or your travel agent, who will forward it to Alaska for mailing.

Family's House Razed, Planning Benefit Party

A pioneer family of Northwest Detroit faced a bleak Thanksgiving and a very dreary Christmas this year.

On Saturday, November 17, (for the second time), fire destroyed the home and furnishings of Mabel Vincent, 68, her husband, Parma, and her handicapped son, Jimmy. The cause of the fire is undetermined but the charred remains of the home are mute evidence of the fierce blaze that destroyed the treasures that Mrs. Vincent had collected during the 68 years of her life.

The only picture of her mother is a charred spot on the wall. A Christmas Manger, presented to her 29 years ago by a boy scout troop, lay broken and burned on the front steps. Just inside the door her sewing basket, that held the Christmas gifts that she had crocheted for her grandchildren is a sodden mass, beyond repair. All her china dishes, collected over the years, are cracked and broken. In the kitchen stands a lump of metal that was a lovely new ice box that Mrs. Vincent had just finished paying for by working as a dishwasher at Botsford Inn in Farmington.

Mrs. Vincent, or "Mabel," as she is known to everyone, has taken her loss bravely. Her only remark was, "I guess we were lucky. No one was hurt. There isn't much insurance, but dad, Jimmy and I can get along if we have a roof over our heads and a kitchen that I can cook in."

Mabel and Parma have been faithful members of Wolverine Legion Post 171 for 22 years. Never a month has passed that they haven't helped someone. Mabel has worked many, many hours at the Veterans' Hospital, and always helps her Auxiliary in every way. Wolverine Post and the Legion Auxiliary have planned a benefit card party to help raise funds for the Vincent family. The party is to be held Saturday evening, December 16, at the Wolverine Post rooms at 16874 Lahser Road, Detroit 19, at 8 p.m. Everyone is invited.
