Predict Over 60,000 Population In Area By 1980

If projected population figures issued by the Detroit Metropolitan Area Regional Planning Commission this week prove correct, the combined population of Farmington City and Township will be more than doubled by 1970 and over three times as great by 1980. The figures show that Farmington City and Township had an estimated population of 20,000 by 1955. Projections for 1970 show the combined population estimated at 45,000. The projected figures for 1980 show it to be 62,000.

Projections for 1970 show the population show an increase in population from 4,300 in 1955 to 8,000 in 1970 and thence to 10,000 by 1980. These figures are based on the premise that the boundaries of the city will remain the same. Incorporation of any portions of the township into the city would naturally alter these estimates proportionately.

Projections of population similar to these were made for all governmental units in the six county area surrounding Detroit, including Oakland, Wayne, Macomb, Monroe, St. Clair and Washtenaw counties. The projections indicate that the population for this six county area will reach 6,050,000 by 1980. The 1960 population of the area thus will be almost equal to the number of people who lived in the entire state of Michigan according to 1950 census figures.

In the four-county area around Detroit including Wayne, Oakland, Macomb and Monroe County projections show a 123.6 per cent increase in population by 1980. For Detroit proper, on the other hand, only a 2.5 per cent population increase is anticipated by 1980. Figures for Oakland County show an estimated population in 1955 of 541,730. Projected figures for 1970 show the county population to be 577,400 and figures for 1980 show it will be 1,158,400.

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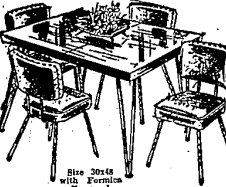
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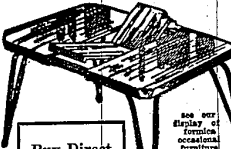
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
