Elliot S. Rogers, Residents Committee Chairman, stated that the existing potential of a league of subdivision associations is being developed, not only due to the existence of natural units for a representative-type organization but also due to the high caliber of the citizenry in residence. "The full report will be helpful to the by-laws committee. Good organization is probably one of the secrets of success in an association so large as this to be township-wide and dealing with problems as complicated as those of a growing community," Rogers said.

"Our goals for a good community are to include, but not only tangibles like good roads and intangibles like preservation of beauty but also the American dream of active self-government. However, it will be unfortunate if they remain unattainable because we made no intelligent attempt to achieve them."

He means careful organization by men with some experience in the administration and affairs of non-profit organizations," Rogers stated. "Our hope is that every subdivision association president or secretary will get in contact with our secretary. We ask all civic minded residents to consult their association officials or George Squires, on this matter."

## Planned Development Of Adequate Sewerage Disposal Systems Urged

The following article was prepared by Morton S. Hilbert, director of the Division of Engineering and Sanitation, Wayne County Health Department, in cooperation with the Regional Planning Commission of the Metropolitan Detroit area, including all of Oakland County, in hopes of encouraging planning to improve sewerage disposal facilities in rapidly growing communities in the area.

The expansion of housing facilities in the Detroit Metropolitan area is continuing at a rapid rate. Available sewerage systems in most areas are no longer adequate to handle the continued development and expansion in many of the suburban areas. Relief sewers, new sewerage systems and numerous extensions of existing facilities are essential to keep pace with the demand for new housing areas.

A study of the long-range needs for sewerage disposal, based on the anticipated development in the metropolitan area, indicates the need for an extensive program of relief sewer construction in many of the metropolitan areas. Under the present methods of financing, it is difficult, and in many areas impossible, to secure a sufficient tax base to provide for the construction of interceptor sewers with a capacity sufficient to meet the ultimate needs of the area. In order that development may take place continually in a manner which provided adequate protection for public health through treatment of sewage, it is necessary to develop a means by which an intermediate solution to the sewage disposal problems can be accomplished.

In some sections of the metropolitan area, private sewage disposal installations such as septic tanks and small treatment plants are used. Commercial establishments have been extensively used. Almost without exception this temporary, piecemeal, short-sighted individual means of disposing of sewage has developed extensive hazards to the health of the communities involved.

Experience has shown that small sewage treatment plants designed to serve several communities in the various natural drainage areas can serve as an intermediate solution to the important sewage disposal problems of the region. In 1938, the Wayne County Road Commission developed a number of small treatment plants in Wayne County to serve the north-central and north-west areas of Wayne County. These plants were expected to provide an adequate means of sewage disposal for a period of approximately 10 to 15 years. These facilities provided a means by which trunk and lateral sewer systems could be installed and, as a result, extensive industrial, commercial and residential development took place without the

contamination of ditches, streams, lakes and ground surfaces, which would have taken place if only septic tanks and other private disposal facilities had been provided. As the area developed and the tax base increased, it was possible to secure the necessary financing for the relief sewerage system and the elimination of the temporary treatment plants was accomplished.

This same procedure can be extended to many of the numerous expanding sections of the metropolitan area and could establish a pattern for the well-planned orderly development of the metropolitan area of Michigan. The continued promiscuous development of land with septic tanks and other makeshift temporary sewage disposal facilities will serve only to increase the numerous health hazards which now exist in many metropolitan communities.

## Specialist Gives Tips On Variety Of Nut Uses

Nuts of all kinds have scores of uses in holding cooking and baking, say food specialists.

Use them uncracked, in a nut bowl for between meal snacks. They add good texture to stuffing for holiday turkeys and spars. Cooked vegetables such as green beans, broccoli and Brussels sprouts.

Nuts also enhance pies, biscuits, muffins, waffles, quick breads, cookies, fruit salads and sandwich fillings, declare Michigan State University food specialists. They remind that shelled nuts keep best in airtight containers in a cool, dark place as long as nuts in the shell. Shelled nuts are even more perishable.

Shelled nuts do keep well in tight containers for a year in a freezer. If you package your own for freezer storage, be sure to package them in usable amount.

If your recipe calls for blanched Brazil nuts or almonds, cover the shelled nuts with cold water. Bring to a boil and simmer two or three minutes. Drain, add cold water, drain again. Pinch each nut to slip the skins. Filberts should be placed in a shallow pan in an oven set at 250 degrees or 275 degrees for about 20 minutes or until skins loosen. Rub them with a coarse towel or with your fingers. Toasting improves the flavor as well as making them more easily used.

If you want to serve nuts salted, put one cup of whole nuts or nutmeat bits in a pan with one tablespoon butter. Break them in moderate oven, 350 degrees F., stirring often. Drain them on paper towels and salt them while warm.

## Township Launches Drive To Obtain Added Support For Water System

### Urges Interested Owners In Proposed District To Sign Petitions At Township Office

Township officials are beginning work this week on a resurvey of those areas in the proposed water district where a comparatively small return of petitions or questionnaires was received during the original canvass.

The resurvey is being made at the suggestion of Judge Arthur E. Moore, who has been serving as legal counsel to the Board on the water problem. The purpose of the program is to secure as many signatures as possible from those property owners in the proposed district who are interested in participating in the water system. Section maps have been prepared by the Township Clerk and are being marked to designate those property owners interested in the program.

## Zoning Proposals Aired At Hearing

Recommendations on two proposed amendments to the Township Zoning ordinance, one of approval and one of rejection, were handed down by the Zoning Board during a public hearing held Wednesday evening at the Town Hall.

The Board recommended approval on the proposal to rezone from Residential Two to Residential Three all of Brookside Park Subdivision excepting those lots on Eight Mile Road which are presently shown as industrial on the zoning map. Brookside Subdivision is located on the west side of Middlebelt Road and north of Eight Mile Road.

The second proposal, pertaining to the rezoning of two lots at the northwest corner of Middlebelt and 10 Mile Roads from Residential to Commercial, was rejected by the Board. This proposal was previously submitted to the Zoning Board and rejected. Edward Schmid, chairman of the Board, stated that the proposal was rejected on the grounds that it would represent "spot zoning". This is the same reason as was given at the previous hearing. There were no objections for and against the proposal by citizens attending the hearing.

Any property owners living in these areas who are interested in participating in the proposed water district are urged to contact Florent A. Cairns, Township Clerk, at the Town Hall, as soon as possible.

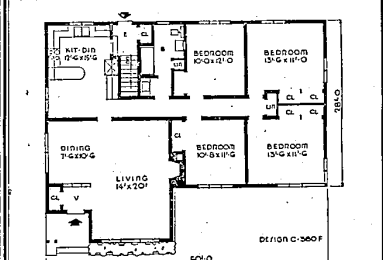
Gain also reported that a study on the proposed purchase of road grading equipment has been made and a suggested contract has been forwarded to the County Road Commission for study and comment. It has been proposed that the Township purchase a grader or truck with blade to be placed under the supervision of the County for exclusive use in the Township.

Mrs. Elsie Avery, trustee, raised a question on the legality of the proposed ban on an ordinance from the Attorney General. Gain stated that other townships were following this plan. Mrs. Avery stated that the plan was in favor of the township, provided it was legal. The supervisor added that action would be delayed pending a report from the Road Commission.

Dr. S. A. Broadman, 25705 Middlebelt Road, was appointed township health officer by action of the Board. Gain suggested that Dr. Broadman be appointed to the position. In a statement to the Board, Dr. Broadman said that he accepted the position and would follow up all complaints referred to him in writing by the Board.

It was reported at the meeting that the community well on Rhoads Street, in the Tarabusi Rose-land Gardens Subdivision, is expected to be ready for public use this Friday.

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## The Handyman's NOTEBOOK

How would you like to help your wife cut out a lot of the work she now does in the course of looking after your family wash?

Best of all, it's a project that will cost only a fraction of the price of a washing machine.

The little job I have in mind is the addition of a laundry chute—a wonderful convenience for anyone whose laundry equipment is in the basement, as so many are. It's a simple project, yet it will save thousands of steps in even the first few weeks.

First of all, pick the best location. The three most popular spots are the bathroom, a hall and the main bedroom, but your choice will depend a lot on what's below each of these rooms.

The opening can be cut in either the floor or the wall. You'll find it best to drill a small, experimental hole in the least conspicuous place, just to be sure you'll be cutting where you think you're cutting.

As long as you've checked thoroughly to make sure there are no wires, pipes or joists in the way, you'll find it as easy thing to cut an opening to the desired size and fitting it with either a gate-style or binnacle door.

The basement portion can be simple or elaborate, just as you wish. You may want a closed chute, but a basket set under the opening may serve you just as well.

By the way, how tight are the outside doors at your place? We are featuring 17 in. feet of bronze weatherstripping, enough for the average door, for only 89c the inch. Locking thresholds are \$1.09 and up. Have a warmer floor and save fuel.

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
