Suggest Preparing, Freezing Eggnog

Plan ahead for your holiday parties and BE READY for unexpected guests who are bound to drop home demonstration agent, suggests that you freeze egg nog in different quantities to be prepared for any size crowd.

To make egg nog for about 30 servings, beat six egg yolks until they are light-yellow, gradually adding one cup of sugar. Stir in three cups of milk. Fold in one pint of whipping cream, whipped stiff, and one and a half quarts of egg nog ice cream which has been thawed to the mushy stage.

Whip six egg whites with ¼ teaspoon of salt and fold into the mixture. Pour the egg nog into containers and freeze.

Mrs. Baird reminds you that the thawing time will vary with the amount frozen in each container. If you freeze the whole container, thaw it at room temperature for half a day. Smaller amounts will be thawed accordingly.

Just before serving beat the mixture of mushy consistency with an electric beater. Garnish each cup with freshly ground nutmeg and serve with thin slices of fruit cake or a sweet thin like these Christmas cherry cookies.

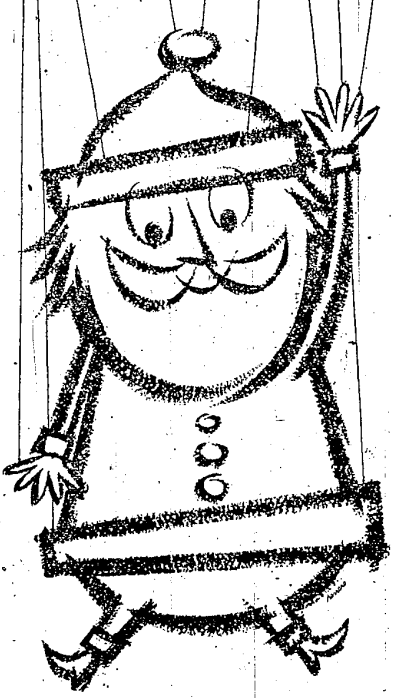
