THE STATE MAY NEED ITS OWN NAVY to settle the latest controversy in its home waters. Under attack is a business venture new to Michigan, the "flet" or floating hotel.

At the request of Gerald M. Eddy, director of the Michigan Conservation Department, the attorney general's office is seeking an injunction against the first flet—the S. S. Western States, docked at Tawas City.

The question: Do floating hotels moored permanently on the shore above state held lands violate the law?

State officials believe there is a violation. Submerged land under the Great Lakes is controlled by the Conservation Department according to an 1899 law. One of the requirements: Protect the public interest.

The request for an injunction to prevent the operation of the S. S. Western States is based on the assumption that the ship is not for navigation. If not, it may be permanently and unlawfully occupying submerged lands in violation of the public interest.

Tawas City officials want the "flet" to stay. The city council entered into a five year contract to moor the ship at a public pier dock. Water and sewer connections "tie" the flet to shore.

State officials fear that with "good" commercial land becoming scarce in Michigan, an uncontrolled number of flets would eventually line the shores of popular lake resort areas unless the question is cleared up soon. They point out that all Michigan residents have the right to use the Great Lakes.

The final answer is in the hands of the admirals—oops, judges in the Michigan courts.

FISHING LICENSES

Hunting seasons are much in the spotlight, but there is news for the fishermen too.

Michigan's 1957 fishing licenses and fish law digests have been mailed out to 4200 license dealers in the state and will be available from most dealers December 1. A record 1,900,000 licenses are being distributed.

Fishermen are allowed to take black bass from all waters except designated trout lakes and streams through December 31. Also, sturgeon fishing will be legal on inland lakes and streams—except in trout waters—after January 1. For details, fishermen should check the new fish law digest.
