Indicate New Fishing Lakes Can Be Stocked

Michigan has a "reserve pool" of presently unused lakes that can be used in the day when our growing population drives fishermen from today's more popular fishing waters. Conservation officials indicated.

These are sterile northern soft-water lakes and the southern marl bottom lakes. In total, Michigan has several hundred of these lakes. The water chemistry of both these groups of lakes is such that little vegetation and fish food is produced and consequently little fish life.

But Conservation Department biologists have proved that vegetation can be produced in both types of lakes at moderate cost.

Fisheries workers added bags of peat to the southern marl bottom lakes and dumped lime in the northern soft-water lakes and both showed increased production of fish food. Both tests have ranged over the last several years.

These tests indicate that when funds become available, or when the press of fishermen on today's popular lakes becomes too heavy, that many of these presently unused lakes will be able to produce recreational fishing.

Under certain conditions, private corporations which serve the public — like telephone and power companies or other public utilities — may exercise the right to condemn property. The same conditions apply, however, when used lakes will be able to produce recreational fishing.

Any time your property is condemned, following determination of necessity, you can go to court if you think you're being offered an unreasonably low price and then the compensation can be determined by a jury.

Deer Kill Set At 70,000 For '56 Season

Michigan hunters bagged some 70,000 deer during regular and special firearm seasons in northern areas of the state this year, according to statistical estimates by Conservation Department game specialists.

In the upper and northern lower peninsula, an estimated 58,300 deer were taken by hunters during the regular season and another 12,000 whitetails were bagged during special season.

In comparison with past year, the regular season buck kill was 18 percent below the 1955 total of 41,820, but also was 11 percent above the buck kill for the 1954 buck kill. Department field personnel reported a general decrease in the number of hunters affixed this year.

The largest regular season drop was recorded in the upper peninsula where hunters took an estimated 21,200 bucks this year—more than 20 percent below the 29,150 bagged last fall. Another 750 whitetails were taken this year in the U.P. in more than 50 years.

The northern lower peninsula bag this year—37,100 bucks—was about 11 percent below the 1955 total of 41,820, but also was 11 percent above the buck kill for the region in 1954.

The decline in the buck kill this year anticipated by Department game biologists—undoubtedly was affected by food shortages last winter when more than 25,000 deer died of starvation. At least 10,000 of these starvation victims were buck fawns and could have been legal bucks this fall, if they had lived.

Other results of the critical situation last winter were apparent to game biologists who examined thousands of deer bagged this fall. The physical condition of northern deer generally was poorer than in 1955 season.

Biologists found a decline in antler development, both in number of points and beam diameter, in 1½-year-old bucks. Comparison of deer weights with the special season of 1952 showed that fawns taken this year in the Lake-Noyewy county area averaged almost 32 pounds less than those taken in 1952. This could indicate a threatening future for this year's fawn crop in food shortage areas because feeding experiments show that five pounds may mean the difference between life and death for fawns under critical winter conditions.
