Assn. Of Manufacturers To Press For Change In Taxation Theory

The nation must make a complete change in its whole theory of taxation, because we cannot continue our present course "without facing ultimate disaster," according to Ernest C. Swigert, 1957 president of the National Association of Manufacturers.

The tax system should be designed for raising revenues and for jobbing else, Mr. Swigert declared, adding: "We have gradually adopted a tax system that is devised not to raise revenue but to reform society, to remodel our lives, and to distribute our wealth according to the ideas of economic and social planners. If we had deliberately tried to devise a tax system which would be harmful to economic growth and development—and disruptive to individual initiative—we could hardly have done better."

Senator Charles E. Potter, Republican of Michigan, will introduce a resolution creating a permanent standing Senate Committee on Veterans' Affairs shortly after the opening of the 85th Congress in January.

"Twenty-two million of our citizens are veterans," Senator Potter stated. "We treat so vital a segment of our population like stepchildren? Of course not, but that is what we have been doing."

The Senator pointed out that veterans' legislation, upon arrival from the House of Representatives, often waits for weeks before reaching the Senate floor for consideration. He said that a number of important veterans' bills received no Senate attention at all during the last session.

"A standing Senate committee comparable to the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs is required to properly consider legislation affecting our American veterans. It is time we abandoned the piecemeal approach," Potter stated.

Veterans' matters in the Senate presently are handled by two committees. Pension and compensation bills are sent to the Committee on Finance. Hospitalization, education and loan matters go to the Committee on Labor and Public Welfare.

"The world situation requires us to maintain a strong military establishment," Senator Potter added. "Our millions of Americans are called upon to serve in our armed forces every day. Their problems deserve generous, understanding and above all prompt treatment by the Senate. The very minimum would be a Committee exclusively designated to give all necessary time for careful consideration of veterans' matters."

"Labor and public welfare committees are swamped with other demands on their time. Is this fair to our veterans?"

The standing Senate committee proposed by Senator Potter would consider legislation covering pensions, life insurance, compensation, vocational rehabilitation, education, veterans' hospitals, medical care, civil relief and readjustment of servicemen to civil life, housing and all other matters relating to veterans.

Senator Potter pointed out that since 1940 outlays for veterans' benefits by the federal government have multiplied eight times as now total \$4.5 billions per year.

Stars Brightest In January, Says Astronomer
During January the whole night sky will be ablaze with bright stars and planets, a University of Michigan astronomer declared.

"Many of the brightest stars of the whole year are visible," says Prof. Hazel M. Losh, "making the heavens in the winter perhaps more attractive than at any other time or season of the year."

This winter constellations center around Orion with his two Hanging Dogs and the Bear below him. "Those who devised the constellations evidently intended to depict here a hunting scene," the professor explains, "with the Dogs pursuing the Bear, and it, in turn, crouching low close to Orion, seeking his protection. The winter sky includes Taurus, the Bull. One of the constellations that is not as easy to locate is Cancer, or the Crab. 'The faint stars of the Crab group are invisible upside down letter V.' Professor Losh points out. Near the junction of the upright and the branching lines that form this inverted 'V' is a dim, misty-looking star cluster, formally referred to, as the 'Beehive'."

A perceptible lengthening of the days during January will give rise to a new interest and enthusiasm, since by the end of the month there will be an increase of about 30 minutes over the short days of December. "This will be more noticeable in the evening with the later setting of the Sun than in its earlier rising in the morning," the astronomer suggests.

Planets of interest this month include Jupiter, which will rise around midnight almost exactly at the east point of the horizon. "Jupiter never fails to be a delight to the observer with the small telescope because of the four moons that are so plainly visible," Professor Losh concludes.

LOW UPKEEP
