52 Pct. Of Youths' Deaths In State Due To Accidents

Of the total deaths of school age children last year, 52 per cent were caused by a ecidents—over half of these by motor vehicles. This contrasts sharply with the steady decline in death from disease between ares 5-19. This decline is so marked that in 1936 tuberculosis, polio and appendicitis wereful to be found among the ten leading causes of death.
