

Students To Give Plays In 'Round'

Three one-act plays will be presented by the Junior Class March 29 and 30 in the F. H. S. cafeteria. The plays will be performed in a theater-in-the-round manner with a limited audience each night seated on three sides of the stage.

Two of the plays have been tentatively chosen. They are "Mr. Sycamore," a satirical comedy based on a radio play, and "Fog," a drama. The first calls for a cast of four girls and three boys, and the second needs only three girls.

Tryouts, to be held separately for each play, will begin the week of the new semester, January 29. These will probably be held after school in a classroom.

Rehearsals will start Monday, February 18.

Qualify To Take National Math Scholar Tests

The National Merit Scholarship Corporation has announced that two senior students at F.H.S. have qualified to become semi-finalists in the NMSS program.

The two students are Linda Kelly and Donna Wilkins.

Out of the 182,000 that took the test 1,500 have qualified so on to the semi-finals. This number has to be cut down to 700.

The scholarships are for four years and are varying sizes.

Semi-finalists were asked to take the Scholastic Aptitude Test of the College Entrance Examination Board given at designated centers Saturday, January 12.

They were also asked to complete a biographical form, and to designate the college they wish to attend.

Finalists will be selected on the basis of scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test, school recommendations, leadership qualities, and biographical and financial information.

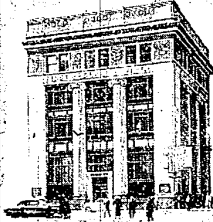

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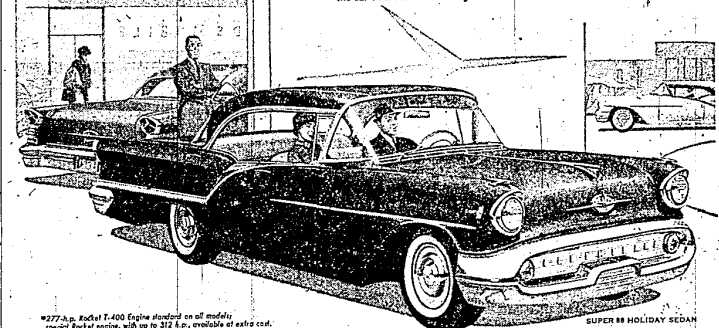
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
