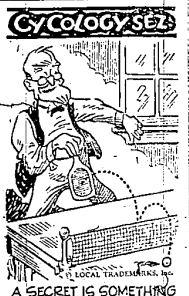


IT'S A GIRL

Talk On Russia's Education System Given Jan. 21

Guest speaker at the regular meeting of the Bond School PTA will be given on Monday evening, January 21, at 8 p.m. at the Bond School will be Russell Robins. Mr. Robins will speak on his recent trip to Russia with emphasis on the educational system in that country which Mr. Robins took a special interest in. The topic of his talk will be "The Value Russia Places on Education Plus Skilights on My Trip to Russia."

A sales and marketing executive with the L. A. Young Spring and Vise Corporation, Robins travels as much as 150,000 miles a year. He is in charge of his company's high priority diversification and expansion program. In the July 1956 issue of Business Week, Robins was described as a new type of career man whose job it is to "rack down companies that are for sale or that may be persuaded to hang out the For Sale sign and to determine if and how their product would dovetail into the home operation." As new companies are acquired he also shoulders the responsibility of stimulating their development and growth.

Robbins is a featured speaker at sales rallies and Sales Clubs throughout the United States. He is a director and 1st Vice President of the Detroit Sales Executives Club, Inc.

In October Robbins toured Russia in addition to Moscow, the cities of Kiev and Kharkov in the Ukraine. In the nine days he spent in the Soviet Union, he met with top Russian leaders in the Kremlin, saw several plants, and was entertained by the American Ambassador and the U. S. S. R. Chamber of Commerce.

Formerly associated in sales executive capacities with the Tractor & Implement Division of the Ford Motor Co. and Ralston-Purina Co., Robbins is a widely known authority in his field. He is an accomplished speaker on such topics as marketing, sales, dealer development and sales training. A special soloist will also appear at the PTA meeting. Mrs. June Stromback will sing.
