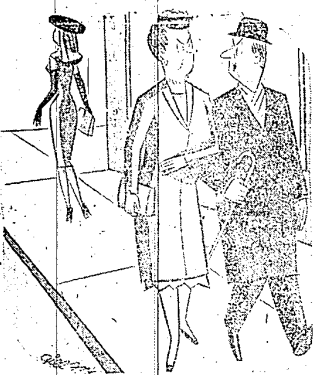

charge for either lecture. (L.E.C.)

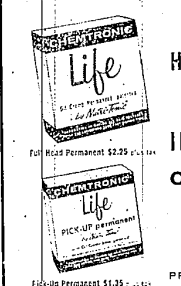
Trip Club Funds Being Collected

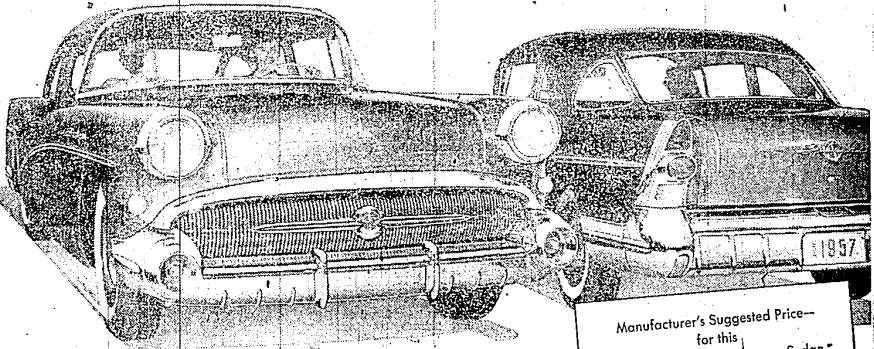
