Arrowsmith Tool, Die Team Wins State Amateur Hockey Title

Copsecutive win number 58 was a home game for Arrowsmith Tool and Die at Olympia last Saturday.

The local team defeated Houghton's Copper Country Flyers 4-2 in the third consecutive State Amateur hockey championship. The Die makers will defend the national championship they won last year at Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., March 29-31.

Holding the rest of the league teams to six goals in 14 games, Arrowsmith sharpshooters gave opposing goalies nightmares by drilling home 158 takes in their undefeated season.

Arrowsmith defeated East Side Sports' "Red Sox" 6-0 in the semifinals and copped the city title; defeating Klett Cadillac 6-0 in the finals.

The Die makers, stayed on the winning track, smothering Midland 18-1 in a regional game and took the Southern Michigan Championship by overpowering Dearborn, 12-0, at Olympia.

"Arch" Fred Spang's big guns were nearly the five top scorers in the A.H.L.'s junior division, led by Jim Siebert's 26 goals. Roger Nordstrom, Tom Mustonen, Frank Silks and Jerry Wallace followed him in point scoring.

Two members of the team are Michigan State freshmen, commuted from Lansing to Detroit for their hockey week-ends.

Sixets from New York, Massachusetts, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Michigan and several other states will challenge Farmington's title in the National Tournament at the Saulte next month. The Die makers defeated the Saulte team in the championship final last spring.

Falcons Battle Lakers To Finish, Lose Out 72-66

The Farmington gaucers lost a hardfought battle to the Vikings from Walled Lake last Friday.

In the third quarter, the Gaucers defense to bottle up the major scoring threat of Walled Lake, center Larry Hughes, but the Vikings scored three touchdowns off the backs of the Falcons. The other men on the floor continued to feed to Hughes who took top scoring honors as Farmington ahead on a record of 35 points.

Bud Jones was hard on his heels in the scoring race, making this game really a battle of the centers hitting for 26 points.

On both teams the scoring was a matter of teamwork, and it was best exemplified by the scoring of the first half of the game.

Dave Wannier and Don McDonald scored 12 apiece and Dave Cathrman and Tom Kosty each had seven points.

The first quarter broke hot and heavy and teamwork paid off. It was a neck and neck battle until the end of the first quarter on a beautiful pass play between Wannier and Jones that ended in a back-handed pass to Wannier under the basket. This play set the closing moments of the first quarter gave Farmington a 22-20 lead over Walled Lake.

The second quarter saw another close race with Walled Lake finally eking out a two point lead, 42-40.

As play slowed down in the third quarter but the score stayed with in a range of two or three points. Everyone realized that a break must come and it did. In the last moments of the third quarter MacDonald of Farmington sprained his ankle and was removed from the game. The Falcons held the lead 48-40, but in the fourth scoring 10 points as the Vikings held an uneasy lead, 58-55.

The Falcons were outplayed in the second quarter, but evened with Walled Lake until the last two minutes when Walled Lake, with a two point lead, began a stall move. The Gaucers tried to defeat pattern and John Walker moved in and scored. Farmington failed to score on the next play and the Vikings took over control of the ball, but their last chance had passed and Walled Lake retained its lead to win 72-66.

Both boys contribute their victories to their managers.


