LUSH LIME COOLER

1/2 pint (1 c.) lime sherbet
1 can (6 oz.) frozen concentrated limeade
3 c. milk
Scoops lime sherbet
In mixing bowl or blender beat sherbet; add limeade. Add milk. Pour into glasses. Top each with scoop of sherbet. Garnish with fresh mint or minted cherry. Serve immediately. Yield: five cups.

M-M-MOCHA SHAKE

2 c. milk
5/8 instant coffee
1 T. sugar
1 pint chocolate ice cream
1/4 almond extract
Sweetened whipped cream
Shaved chocolate
Dissolve coffee and sugar in 1/4 cup hot milk; cool. In mixing bowl or blender beat ice cream. Add remaining milk, coffee mixture and almond extract. Pour into glasses. Garnish each with whipped cream and shaved chocolate. Yield: 3 1/2 cups.

WALNANA SHAKE

1/2 pint black walnut or butter pecan ice cream
1/2 c. (1 small) mashed ripe banana

ORANGE TASTE-TWISTER

1 pint orange sherbet

PURPLE PEOPLE COOLER

1/2 pint (1 c.) vanilla ice cream
1 can (6 oz.) frozen concentrated grape juice
1 envelope (1.25 oz.) vanilla instant breakfast
2 c. milk
2 T. fresh lemon juice
Vanilla ice cream
In a mixing bowl or blender beat ice cream; add grape juice and instant breakfast. Pour into frosted glasses. Top each with small scoop of ice cream. Yield: five cups.
*Note: To frost glasses brush outside rims with egg white. Dip rims in sugar. Place glasses in freezer or refrigerator until ready to use.

When you talk about the little pig that went to market, consider Michigan's 285 million pounds of pork. Michigan is 7th among the states with production centered in Cass, Lenawee, St. Joseph and Branch counties.

Pesticide Content Is Cut By Cooking

Michigan State University research on pesticide residues in cooked meat indicates that homemakers' worries about the safety of certain foods are largely unwarranted.

The word comes from Kathleen R. Bufton, Wayne County extension home economist in the expanded nutrition program.

Research on pesticide residues in pork loin roasts and chops showed that, no matter what the cooking method, braising, broiling or cooking by microwave energy, cooking substantially reduces the pesticide residues in the meat.

In all instances, less than 50 per cent of the pesticide in the raw sample remained in the meat after it was cooked.

Roasting and broiling seemed to be the cooking methods that caused the greatest pesticide loss.

According to the home economist, similar studies with pork sausage showed a reduction of pesticide residues of least 35 per cent in sausage fed excessively high doses of dieldrin, and as much as 75 per cent in sausage from animals fed a normal diet.

Pan frying was the cooking that resulted in the greatest pesticide loss, followed by baking and cooking by microwave energy.

New Process Aids Leukemia Victims

Blood donors are being sought by the Children's Leukemia Foundation, 17801 W. Seven Mile, Detroit.

The blood is needed for a new treatment of leukemia victims. It is being used to a limited extent in Children's Hospital, Detroit.

The treatment is "leukopheresis." It involves passing fresh blood over nylon fibers and removing neutrophils (germ-fighting; white blood cells). Separated and

securely trapped, the neutrophils are ready for processing and transfusing into the blood of the leukemia patient. The process was developed by Dr. Isaac Djerrassi of Philadelphia.

"Never before," says Dr. Wolff Zoller, director of the Child Research Center and chairman of the Children's Leukemia Foundation of Michigan, "has medical science been closer to a cure to leukemia."

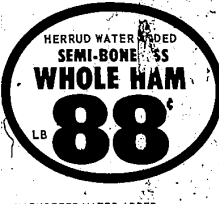

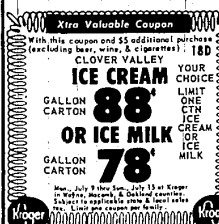

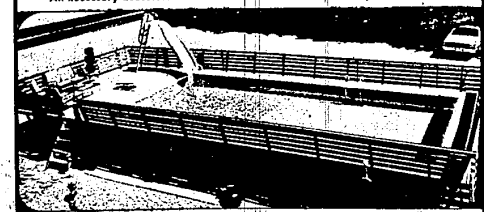
