

Falcon Wrestlers Place 21st In State Meet

Farmington High placed 21st in the state wrestling tournament held in Lansing March 16-17 with a one point scoring total.

Lansing Eastern won the Meet with an unofficial total of 93 points.

Of 48 schools which are eligible for the State Meet, 38 qualified and competed.

The Falcons had four wrestlers in the Meet — Bob Dwyer, Jerry Cassell, Jim March, and George Fawcett. These boys qualified for the State Meet by virtue of their winning places in the Regional Wrestling Tournament held March 9 at Berkley.

Of the Farmington wrestlers, George Fawcett is the only one who received a point, giving the Farmington team its lone scoring tally.

The highest number of points which any one wrestler received in the Tournament was about 14.
