Preparing Mural In Biology Room

Prehistoric animals are being recreated at Clarenceville High School through the efforts of four second year biology students. Rather than use cells and magic pointers, however, Janet Van Arman, Nancy Lawson, Sandra Miffland, and Karen Brown have found that paint brushes and enamels are much more effective, as well as safer.

The mural, which the girls have been working on, is approximately four by eight feet. Included in the scene are an array of animals and vegetation. The girls have been working on the project for several months, after school, beginning with charcoal sketches and gradually applying various stages of paint establishing light and shades.

Mr. Thompson, biology instructor, and Mr. Deeter, art instructor, have been guiding the students of efforts. It is Mr. Thompson's plan to have second year biology classes in the future add panels to the mural.

Right now the painting is housed in the Journalism room but at its completion in May will be hung in the biology room.
