The one act play by Dorothy Clark Wilcox took place in a bombed city. It dramatized the tremendous destructive forces of fear and hate resulting in war and ruin. The part of the Air Force pilot who had escaped his crashed plane and in a state of shock into the ruined city, was played by Lee O'Connor. This was superbly dramatized by fire, lights, and sound. As he lay unconscious among the rubble of fallen buildings, Marlene Fenton and Leonard (Bud) Stone portrayed the only remaining residents of the city. They developed the basic cause of the destruction—fear, hate and greed. After the pilot had died, despite their efforts to save him, the two remaining then resolved to rebuild a new city where people were unafraid and brotherly-love would replace hate. The play was produced and directed by Bessie Hagman, assisted by Lee O'Connor. Lighting, sound, and staging were handled by Donald Briggs, John Perry and Charles Hagman.

Rehearsals have been continued for the public presentation of "Two Blind Mice," a three act comedy, to be given Friday and Saturday nights, May 10 and 11 and May 17 and 18 officially.

At Marillac Hall

An open house and tea will be sponsored by the Marillac Guild at Marillac Hall, a resident for girls with problems, on Inkster Road at Northwestern Highway.

To be held Sunday, March 31, from 3-5 p.m., the open house and tea will provide an opportunity for all interested persons to register for membership in the Guild.

The purpose of the Guild is two-fold officials said. It provides an activity program for the residents. Shopping tours, outings, and parties are planned and executed by Guild members.

Before the construction of the Hall in 1953, a wing of Providence Hospital was used to house the girls.

This month the Sisters commemorated the Feast Day of their Foundress, St. Louise of Marillac, for whom the Hall is named.

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Explains Visiting
Nurse Service

Mrs. Keith Willoughby, president of the Farmington Visiting Nurse Committee, reports that inquiries are being received for a more complete explanation of the services offered by the Visiting Nurse Association.

The visiting nurse renders to a home patient any kind of nursing care the physician orders, Mrs. Willoughby said. This may mean change of dressings, baths, injections, massage or medication. The nurse also teaches the family how to give the required care between the nurse's visits.

Mrs. Willoughby explained that industrial nursing is another service to the community. On an hourly basis small plants can have regular visits to help with fire, accident prevention and plant sanitation.

Farmington requests for visiting nurse service should be directed to the district office for southern Oakland County at 307 West Sixth Street, Royal Oak. The telephone number is: Lincoln 2-1200.

A set charge is made for home nursing visits but, all fees can be adjusted, if necessary, to the family's ability to pay, Mrs. Willoughby explained.
