Driver Training Registration Closes April 1

Students who wish to take driver training this summer must turn in their applications, signed by their parents, to Mr. James Geiger on or before April 1.

Two requirements must be fulfilled before the summer session begins. The applicant must be 16 by the first day of class, Monday, June 17, and must have secured a Driver Training Permit previous to this date. The permit may be procured at the city or township police station for a \$3.00 fee. Township residents must go to the Wheeler Fire Hall on Middlebelt Road near Grand River. Each student must be accompanied by his father and have legal proof of his age (birth certificate or baptismal certificate). Licenses are issued on Mondays from 1 p.m. - 8 p.m.

The length of the course has not yet been determined and will depend on student registration and school board approval. It is possible that two summer sessions may be offered. D.G.

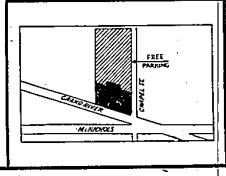
