Cranbrook Art Galleries Plan Spring Exhibition

Cranbrook Academy of Art Galleries will open its first exhibition of the spring season on Friday evening, April 5, from 8 to 10 p.m., according to Wallace Mitchell, Head of Galleries. GRAPEFRUIT

To properly prepare grapefruit halves, Consumer Marketing Information agents suggest you cut them in half crosswise and remove the seeds. Then with a thin, flexible knife, carefully cut each segment loose from the peel and the membrane, since these give a bitter flavor to the fruit. Loosen the outer edge of the segments by running the knife just inside the peel. Then cut vertically down each side of each membrane. This kind of cutting prevents the grapefruit from having that "mutilated" look and yet, makes it easy to eat.

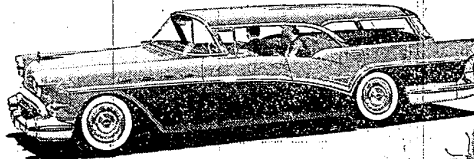

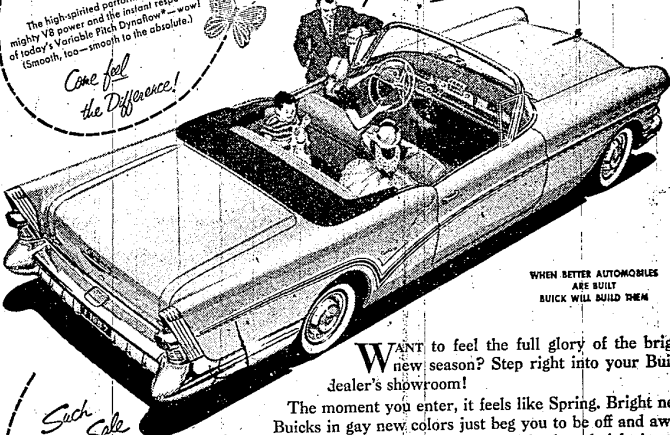

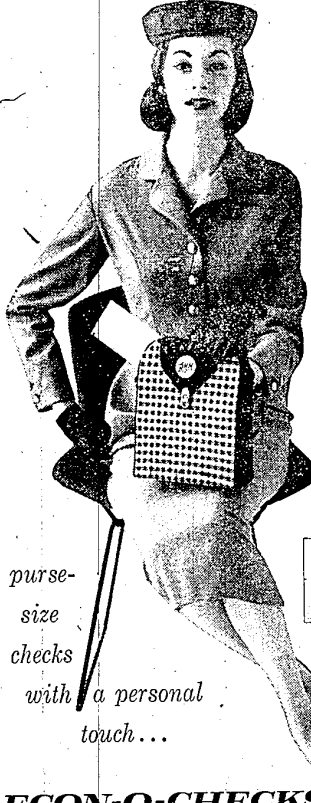
