





C. P. A. Firm Files Township Audit

The firm of Scovel, Wellington and Company released this week a detailed report on the cash receipts and disbursements of the General Fund, Trust and Agency Funds and Special Assessment Funds of Farmington Township as the result of the audit completed last week.

The report covers the eleven months' period ended February 28, 1957. The auditing firm stated that the examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as was deemed necessary. "In our opinion, the accompanying statements present the recorded cash receipts and disbursements for the eleven months ended February 28, 1957, and the balance of cash and securities on hand in the funds mentioned at that date," the auditors stated.
