SAY EXCESS SUMS SPENT ON VITAMINS

Part of the 300 million dollars a year that Americans spend on vitamins could be saved, according to editors of a leading National magazine, if purchasers would ask for their doctor's advice on whether they needed them.

They report that only one-third of the vitamins people buy are bought with a doctor's prescription. They list four principle points about vitamins:

1. Several of the vitamins that look so important listed on the bottle are put in solely for sales purposes. Scientists are not even sure they are needed by the normal human body. 2. No amount of vitamins can "supercharge" you with boundless energy. 3. The supply is simply thrown off by the body. 4. An adequate diet provides the vitamins our bodies need.

and in much better form than drugs can. 4. There are dangers in taking too many of certain vitamins.

To play safe on vitamins, and save money, the editors suggest eating a basic daily diet of seven types of food: Group I—dark green and deep-yellow vegetables; Group II—citrus fruit, tomatoes, raw cabbage; Group III—potatoes, other vegetables and fruits; Group IV—milk, cheese, ice cream; Group V—meat, poultry, fish, eggs, dried peas, beans; Group VI—bread, flour, cereals; Group VII—butter, margarine.

If you have allergies, or a dietary restriction, you may need supplemental vitamins. Mothers, children and babies often need vitamins. In these instances, check with your doctor for a prescription.
